## WANT A MURDERER

WHO IS SERVING IN THE PENITENTIARY HERE.

Indiana Will Extradite a Man Now Serving Sentence—He Committed Murder Thirteen Years Ago.

A despatch from Laporte, Ind., says: Dago Mitchell, serving a sentence in the penitentiary at Kingston, Ont., will be brought back to Indiana when his term expires, and tried for murder in the first degree. Nearly thirteen years ago Mitchell stabbed and killed William Jones. He escaped and nothing was heard of him until a few months ago, when the police succeeded in locating him in the Kingston penitentiary. The fugitive went to Australia from Marion.

### A HIGH HONOR

Conferred in New York on Former Kingstonian.

At the New York Methodist Episcopal church conference just closed Rev. Dr. Allan MacRossie, pastor of St. James' church, Madison avenue and 12th street, was appointed superintendent of the New York district.

Dr. MacRossie has been pastor of St. James ten years. He is a member of the Methodist board of foreign missions, chairman of the board of directors of the Deacons' Training School, registrar of the conference board of examiners, one of the executive committee of the New York Church Extension Society and a member of the Methodist Hospital in Brooklyn.

Dr. MacRossie is a former Kingstonian, a son of the late Akl. William MacRossie, and a summer resident every year. His Kingston friends, and they are legion, heartily congratulate him and hope he may yet attain to a bishop's seat in the great American church.

### CHICAGO LABOR AFFRAY.

One Man Killed and Another Fatally Wounded.

Chicago, April 6.—In the second of two labor affrays, Maurice Griffin, a non-union man, was killed, and another was fatally wounded by striking marble workers. The wounded men were employed by the Chester N. Marthen Marble company. Griffin, who was thirty years old, was stabbed six times and died from his injuries. Colonne Brosian was struck on the head with a hammer and probably fatally injured. Six men are under arrest.

## DR. ROBERTSON'S PLANS.

New Government Agricultural Position is Rumored.

Ottawa, April 6.—Signs the announcement of the appointment of J. H. Girdale to the position of director of Dominion experimental farms, speculation has been active as to what will be the nature of the appointment of Dr. J. W. Robertson, now chairman of the technical education commission. It has been known for some time that the government does not intend to let his services slip out of reach, and he was rumored as the probable appointee of the farm directorship. It is hinted in government circles, however, that he is in line for something bigger, probably commissioner of Dominion agriculture, a new post. At present the department of agriculture includes branches diverse from that in charge of public health, dominion archives, census branch and registrar of trade and commerce. It is said that Dr. Robertson may be placed at the head of the purely agricultural branches and the others put under the management of the present dominion minister of agriculture.

### CANADA CAN LOOK FORWARD

To Future With Every Hope and Confidence.

Surplus for the year ending March, \$30,500,000.

Estimated revenue, \$117,500,000. Estimated expenditure chargeable to consolidated fund, \$87,000,000.

For the year 1909-10, the actual surplus was \$25,091,963—a new record. Actual revenue for the year, \$101,563,710.

"Let well enough alone" has never been the motto of the Dominion of Canada. In all times past, even when we have had a prosperous condition of affairs, when my predecessors in office were able to make statements, perhaps hardly so rosy as that which it is my pleasure to make to-day, but nevertheless hopeful and encouraging statements—when they had that condition they were not content to let well enough alone, and why should they preach that doctrine to us to-day? If we are to adopt that policy, let us abolish our steamship lines, cut off the subsidies to them, and cease to send trade agents to foreign countries. We are seeking new markets everywhere; our steamships run to all countries, many of them heavily subsidized; we are sending our trade agents over the civilized world; we are doing everything that is inconsistent with the policy of "let well enough alone," because when things are going favorably that is not a reason for doing nothing. It is rather a reason for being alert, to avail ourselves of other opportunities. We need new markets in all directions; need them for the surplus products of Canada as it is to-day, and we shall need them in even greater degree for the vast surplus of Canadian products to come to us from the great west in the near future.

"For these reasons we have endeavored to enlarge our markets in all directions, and if does not seem to be wise, while we are sending agents to Africa and China and the distant parts of the world, to close our eyes to the opportunities lying much nearer home, into that I do not wish to enter, to-day. Every prospect for Canada, to-day, is bright and hopeful. With peace and progress and prosperity at home, with the friendliest relations with the great republic lying alongside of us, with the warmest attachment to the great empire of which we are so proud to form a part, the Canadian people can look forward to the future with every hope and every confidence."—From Hon. Mr. Fielding's Budget speech.

### BANDIT HELD UP TRAIN.

Took About \$300 in Cash From Passengers.

Muncie, Ind., April 6.—A masked man, armed with a revolver, held up and robbed passengers in a vestibule coach attached to the west-bound express train on the Big Four railroad, a few miles east of the city, last night. After taking about \$300 in cash from ten men, the robber dropped off the rear platform of the car as the train slackened speed to enter the city. Several shots were fired at him as he ran, but he escaped.

### PRISONERS BROKE JAIL.

Five Convicts and Guard Killed at Puebla.

Puebla, Mex., April 6.—Five prisoners and one guard are dead as a result of a break for liberty by the occupants of the state penitentiary here. Twenty-two convicts escaped. Following a concerted plan, the prisoners overpowered the chief of the guard, who offered resistance and was killed. A sergeant of the guard squad was mortally wounded. Two soldiers fled with the prisoners and are thought to have aided in the escape.
