KINGSTON TO HAVE A SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION

To Embrace All Kinds of Sport—S. Trotter Was Elected President—The Outlook is Encouraging.

As the result of the meeting of representatives of the various Sunday schools of the city in the Y.M.C.A. building, last evening, an athletic association was formed, under the name of the Sunday School Amateur Athletic Association of Kingston.

The meeting was largely attended and the spirit of enthusiasm which made the basketball league a success as apparent and a most successful launching of the league is predicted.

Stanley Trotter was appointed chairman of the meeting and Robert Trotter secretary. The most important business of the evening was the election of officers, which resulted as follows: Honorary presidents, D. G. Laidlaw, Elmer Davis and Canon Starr; honorary vice-presidents, E. F. Trimble, Rev. E. LeRoy Rice and Ralph Brown; president, Stanley Trotter; first vice-president, H. W. Newman; second vice-president, James Leckie; third vice-president, Frederick Wilson; secretary, Robert Trotter; treasurer, Francis H. Williams. Two representatives of each school will constitute the executive committee.

The question of financing the league and the admittance fee for each club was left over until another meeting.

The secretary was requested to inform all Sunday schools not represented of the result of the meeting that they might enter a team if they wished to do so. The next meeting will be held Thursday evening, April 13th. The offer of the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium for each Tuesday evening from October on was gratefully accepted.

It is the purpose of the association to promote all kinds of legitimate sport, including running, baseball, football, basketball and hockey, and an endeavor will be made to keep some kind of sport going all the year round.

City League Meeting. A meeting of the City Baseball League executive has been called to meet this evening. The main feature will be to elect a president. A great deal of interest in the result of the meeting is being evidenced. The officers of the executive have been doing their best to induce several to accept the nomination, but their efforts seem to be futile.

Mercantile League. The Mercantile Baseball League will meet this evening, when a meeting will be held in the office of the Daily Standard, for the purpose of getting things in shape for the coming season. The league proved to be a big success last season, and a further success is predicted for the coming year. A new man will have to be found to occupy the presidential chair, as last year's president, George A. Mackie, has left the city.

Priceless Autographs. The visitors' books at Buckingham Palace, England, have to be renewed about every three years, being replaced by two fresh volumes. Each visitor at the home of the king and queen places his name in one of the large volumes, and when the books are filled they are filed away in a room in the lord chamberlain's department. Each book contains over 500 pages and is bound in dark red calf, with a crown of gold on the centre of the cover. A silver clasp fastens it.

When King Edward died his visiting books were not filled, but they were filed away. One of the last names appearing on the books was that of Mr. Asquith, who signed the book at the equerries' entrance when he called at Buckingham Palace at the request of the king. The visitors' books stored away contain a collection of signatures that would make the autograph hunter green with envy. There are few statesmen, diplomats, divines, men of letters, financiers, soldiers, members of royalty whose names do not appear.
