**DECIDED ON ROADS**

TO BE BUILT IN THE CITY THIS YEAR.

Two and One-half Miles Will be of Macadam and One Mile of Top-Dressed With Asphalt—Board of Works Gives Carters a New Stand.

The board of works yesterday afternoon definitely decided on recommendation of the city engineer to proceed as soon as the spring opens with the construction of two and one-half miles of macadam roads in the residential sections, as outlined in a four-year plan submitted two weeks ago, and endorsed by the city council. Macadam was decided upon as quite good enough for the residential streets, when the roadways are well drained. Tenders are now being called for the construction of one mile of macadam with an asphaltic top-dressing in the section between Brock and West streets and between Bagot and King streets. This latter type of roadway is to be put down as an experiment and will cost fifty per cent. more than common macadam, but it is expected it will last longer. The work of constructing this mile will be done by an asphaltic firm. The other road construction will be done by the city. Tenders are also being called for the laying of a permanent pavement on 10,000 square yards of business streets.

This year the board's ordinary appropriation is \$11,940. Of this amount, \$500 will be spent in plank crossings, \$400 in asphalt crossings, \$450 in patching walks, \$1,900 in snow removal, \$1,500 in cleaning streets, \$2,225 in general repairs to roads, and \$600 in trimming trees.

As the board has no money for the macadamizing of the extension of Barrie street this year, it was decided to rent the house on the land the city bought for extension purposes, to S. V. McCaig, at eight dollars a month. No action was taken on the request of George Chizzara for permission to place a pop-corn stand on the west side of Montreal street, south of Princess street.

The request of the secretary of the Board of Education, to have the trees fronting the Collegiate Institute thinned out, was referred to the chairman and the engineer, with power to act.

The request of the carters, to be allowed to stand on the south side of Brock street, from Ontario street to the K. & P. railway tracks, was granted.

A petition for a tile sewer on Brock street, to connect with the sewer on Albert street, was granted. The petition for a concrete walk on William street, between Aberdeen street and University avenue, was referred to the sub-committee on the board, which will shortly make a tour of the city to decide what additional walks are required.

In attendance were Aids. Higney (chairman), Bailey, Clugston, Carson, Harrison and Fraser.
