## IN BAD CONDITION

TRIP TO WRECK OF STEAMER SHARPLES.

**Capt. Hinckley, of Oswego, Thinks the Stranded Boat Can be Released—Her Frame is Likely Safe.**

Capt. Gus Hinckley, who went from Oswego to Gallop Island, having on board his steamer, Capt. Reed and Baker, of Detroit, and Cyrus Sinclair, adjuster for the British and Foreign Marine Insurance company, returned to that port, last night, after an inspection of the wrecked steamer Sharples, which lies on the rock near the island in a mass of ice.

The captain states that the steamer is in bad shape but he believes she can be raised. The boat's smoke stack is completely washed away, her stern is in a badly battered condition and her upper cabins are mere frames. Coated with ice of considerable thickness, she looks as if she were a complete wreck. It is thought, however, that her frame is safe, the ice which formed around it early in the winter protecting it from the severity of the waves.

The steamer went ashore in a blinding gale, early last December, and after thirty-two hours of suffering from exposure, her crew was rescued by the Hinckley, which was on her way to Oswego from Alexandria Bay, picking up the lake buoys.

In releasing this steamer the Baker and Reed company will land a good sum, for it is stated that according to terms made with the underwriters they will receive for their work \$20,000. The boat has a large amount of corn in her hold.

### Marine Intelligence.

Grain at Fort William was offered at one and a half cents to Buffalo for delivery at the opening of navigation, and an ore cargo was offered to be moved as soon as insurance attaches. Neither offer found a vessel.

Lights on the St. Lawrence river and Lake Ontario will be lighted on the night of April 10th. If it should hap-

pen that lights are needed before that date they will be provided. The light at Oswego was started for the season last Saturday.

### EASTERN DAIRY SCHOOL.

Twenty-nine Passed Final Examinations.

Of the seventy-four students who registered at the Eastern Dairy School for the session of 1910, only twenty-nine completed the full course, which closed on March 25th. The subjects covered by the written examinations were cheesemaking, separators and butter-making, milk testing, dairy chemistry, dairy bacteriology and miscellaneous (boilers, engines and mathematics), also practical examinations on cheesemaking, butter-making and milk testing. The total marks obtainable were 900. Thirty-three per cent. was required for a pass on each subject, sixty per cent. of the total for second class honors, and seventy-five per cent. for first class honors.
