CANADIAN INDIAN IN BOSTON  
MARATHON.

And He May Run Away From the  
Field—Great Lacrosse Revival in  
the Western Provinces.

Vancouver may have a City Pro-  
Lacrosse League.

There will be at least ten runners in  
the Boston Marathon.

The Winnipeg schools have all decid-  
ed in favour of lacrosse.

Alberta is leading in the revival of  
lacrosse in the North-West.

Hugh Gall, the Varsity football cap-  
tain, will paddle with Parkdale.

Ty Cobb may go into vaudeville at  
the close of the baseball season.

The Waseda University ball team of  
Tokio, Japan, is on its way to Amer-  
ica.

Owner Comiskey, of the Chicago Amer-  
icans, has insured his players for  
\$5,000 each.

Bad weather again interfered with  
most of the training baseball trip  
games in the south.

There are 60,000 lady golfers in Bri-  
tain, who are estimated to spend  
£300,000 annually on the game.

Toronto fans fear that their pitch-  
ing staff will again be weak. Kelley's  
twirlers haven't shown much to date.

The Vancouver amateur lacrosse  
team will send an agent to England  
to try and arrange their European  
tour.

The Canadian Lacrosse Association  
will readopt the old amateur definition  
and affiliate with the Amateur Athle-  
tic Union.

The recent six-day bicycle race killed  
the game in Germany. The riders  
fought on the track and were credit-  
ed with very slow time.

President David Starr Jordan, of  
Stanford University, California, has  
forbidden baseball this year, because  
of "systematic muckraking" infecting  
the sport. The ban will likely be ex-  
tended to football.

A San Francisco report says that  
Feine, of Stanford University, cleared  
six feet four inches in the running  
high jump at a recent meet there,  
with Ward, of Los Angeles, second at  
six feet two inches.

Hugh Daly, one-armed pitcher of the  
Cleveland National League and Chi-  
cago Union Association teams, holds  
the world's season strike-out record.  
In 1884 he pitched fifty-four games  
and struck-out 464 batters, an average  
of 8.59 a game.

Arthur Irwin, the Yankee scout, has  
been offered \$5,000 a year by a Japa-  
nese university, to go to the Orient  
and teach the Japs some of the fine  
points about baseball. The offer guar-  
antees Irwin five years' work.

The efforts to get a third team into  
the British Columbia Lacrosse League  
seem unavailing. At the annual meet-  
ing the Vancouver team wanted to see  
the old Maple Leafs back in the game,  
but New Westminster would not hear  
of it.

As a result of the reduction in the  
number of games to figure in the sched-  
ule of the British Columbia Lacrosse  
Association during the coming season,  
there is a strong probability that the  
Victoria Lacrosse Club will not im-  
port certain players from the east this  
year, as was intended.

Michael Thomas, the Mic-Mac Indian  
runner from Prince Edward Island, who  
has arrived at Boston for the Mar-  
athon race on April 19th, is accom-  
panied by Rev. Father McDonald, of  
Grand River, P.E.I. Father McDonald  
has a great opinion of Thomas and  
thinks he will run away from the field.

**Tax Reform.**

Once again Premier Whitney has  
killed the move, urged by municipali-  
ties, in all parts of the province, to  
have the assessment act changed so  
that it will be permissible to tax im-  
provements at a lower rate than land.  
Sir James seems to think there is a  
deplorable scheme back of this move-  
ment to introduce single tax. He is  
surely frightened at shadows. This  
system of assessment has been found  
to work advantageously in other pro-  
vinces, as is the case, why should it  
not be applied to Ontario, single tax or no  
single tax? He is almost forced to  
believe that pure stubbornness, rather  
than principle, is moving the premier  
in this matter.

**Convention at Napane.**

The annual convention of the Kings-  
ton Presbyterian Union, will be held in  
the Presbyterian church, at Napane,  
Good Friday, and a number of Kings-  
ton delegates will attend. There will  
be an afternoon and evening session.

At the afternoon session, D. A. Shaw,  
of Kingston, will lead the discussion  
on the topic, "What a Young People's  
Society Should Stand For." Rev. J.  
D. Boyd will conduct the devotional  
service in the evening. Rev. Dr. Mac-  
Tavish will speak on the missionary  
programme for the young people.
