# BEGIN TO TRANSFER

2,700 PASSENGERS FROM STRANDED VESSEL.

Fear That the Vessel May Go Down Like a Stone When She is Dislodged From the Shoal.

New York, April 7.—The breeze had freshened considerably this afternoon, when the rescue work began of transferring the twenty-seven hundred passengers and crew of the stranded steamer Princess Irene to her sister ship, Prinz Frederik Wilhelm, to the lone hill bar, fifty miles out of this harbor. By considerable tact, all semblances of a panic among the poor ignorant foreigners aboard the Irene, has been avoided, but fears are entertained that the actual transferring in rolling waters may cause trouble. Several life-saving crews from coast guard stations nearby are surrounding the vessels to avoid fatalities.

As for the stranded steamer itself, there is great cause for alarm that the injuries may be of a permanent character. Some have expressed the opinion that once dislodged from its shoal, she will go down like a stone. She carries a very valuable cargo in addition to her passengers. This spot is part of the proverbial graveyard of the Atlantic.

# THE SKULL OF CROMWELL

Placed on Exhibition—Said to be Genuine.

London, April 7.—The reputed head of Oliver Cromwell was exhibited at a meeting of the Royal Archaeological Society at Burlington house. Rev. H. R. Wilkinson said that the head had been in his family for three generations and in that time had never been previously exhibited in public.

The tradition was that the skull was blown off Westminster hall, and was picked up by a centry, who hid it and only confessed on his deathbed to his wife that he had it in his keeping. It passed into the possession of the Cambridge family of Russell, and came to Samuel Russell, a needy actor.

Then it was sold to Cox, the proprietor of the museum in Spring Gardens, and was transferred by him to three persons, who exhibited it in Bond street. Next it came into the hands of Rev. Mr. Wilkinson's grand father.

Sir Henry Howarth said that the evidence seemed to make it extremely probable that the head shown was really that of the Protector. Prof. Boyd Hawkins did not think he had heard of a more complete chain of circumstances.

# FOR LABOR DAY EVENTS.

Trades and Labor Council Appointed Committee.

At the regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, held on Thursday night, a committee was appointed to arrange for the Labor Day events. The committee will consist of Messrs. Lewis, Driscoll, Fleming, Sinclair, McDonald, McEwan, Pelow, Saave, McCreaney and Cannon. It will be the duty of this committee to first make arrangements for the grounds, and then, later on, it will decide just what form the celebration will take.

William Buck, the president, occupied the chair, and in spite of the inclement weather, there was a very large attendance of members.

The council strongly supported the resolution submitted by the Guelph Trades and Labor Council, opposing to the "short course man," at the prison, being employed in the erection of the buildings, on the ground that it was doing an injury to the trade. This matter was referred to, in detail, in the Whig, a few days ago. The local council will pass a resolution, similar to the one passed by the Guelph Trades and Labor Council, and a copy will be sent to Premier, Whitney and W. F. Nickle, M.P.P.

The council referred to the municipal committee, for action, the communication from Vancouver, B.C., pointing out the danger to health in allowing painters and decorators to do work without first removing old material. A number of bills were received from W. F. Nickle, and these will be duly acknowledged.

# TO PREVENT THE LASSIES

From Selling War Cry in Spokane Saloons.

Spokane, Wash., April 7.—Salvation Army lassies must cease peddling the War Cry or soliciting alms in the saloons in Spokane if Commissioner of Public Utilities D. C. Coates wins support in the stand he took at the administrative meeting of the commissioners. "I believe the ordinance prohibiting women in saloons should be enforced against women of the Salvation Army and all religious organizations as well as against others," said Commissioner Coates. "It is not true that these women are not insolent while in saloons. The Salvation Army has enough men to take around the War Cry."

# The Late Mrs. W. Fawcett.

Mrs. William Fawcett, wife of the reeve of Wolfe Island, passed away in the general hospital, on Friday afternoon, about one o'clock. She was taken suddenly ill last Saturday and was hurried to the hospital where it was found she was suffering from acute appendicitis. She was operated upon Sunday evening and seemed to be doing well and was on the road to recovery. On Thursday evening she was stricken with heart disease and sank rapidly until the end. Her death came as a great shock to her numerous friends, many of whom did not know of the sudden turn which she took.

# USED HER OWN FLESH

AS BAIT WITH WHICH TO CATCH FISH.

Indian Woman Resorts to Heroic Means to Obtain Food for Starving Children—Life Sustained Till Aid Came.

Vancouver, B.C., April 7.—Fish dealers confirm a story that an Indian woman living on a small island north of here cut a piece of flesh from her body in an effort to procure food for her children when they were starving. The woman and children were in desperate straits. The last scrap of food had been eaten the day before and there was no game although the woman searched until her strength gave out.

In this condition she cut a strip of flesh from her body. This flesh was used as bait to catch fish and thus sustained life until aid arrived.

# CITIZENS ARE ARMED.

Business in Prince Rupert, B.C., Suspended.

Prince Rupert, B.C., April 7.—Business was entirely suspended and all citizens, this morning, on the streets are armed with rifles and revolvers, determined to maintain order and prevent a repetition of the outbreak between strikers and police which, last night, resulted in the death of one striker and the serious wounding of a policeman.

# ST. LOUIS BREWER RETURNS

St. Louis, April 7.—Ellis Wainwright, millionaire brewer, who was indicted in the crusade of Governor Folk, and has been an exile in Paris ever since, appeared in court, this morning, and surrendered on a charge of bribery. # AIR FLIGHT OF 215 MILES.

Count Zeppelin Received by King of Wurtemberg.

Stuttgart, Wurtemberg, April 7.—One of Count Zeppelin's best flights in a dirigible balloon was made to-day, when he alighted with several passengers from his monster aircraft, after a seven-hour flight, covering 215 miles, from Friedrichshaven, Germany. He was received cordially by the king of Wurtemberg.
