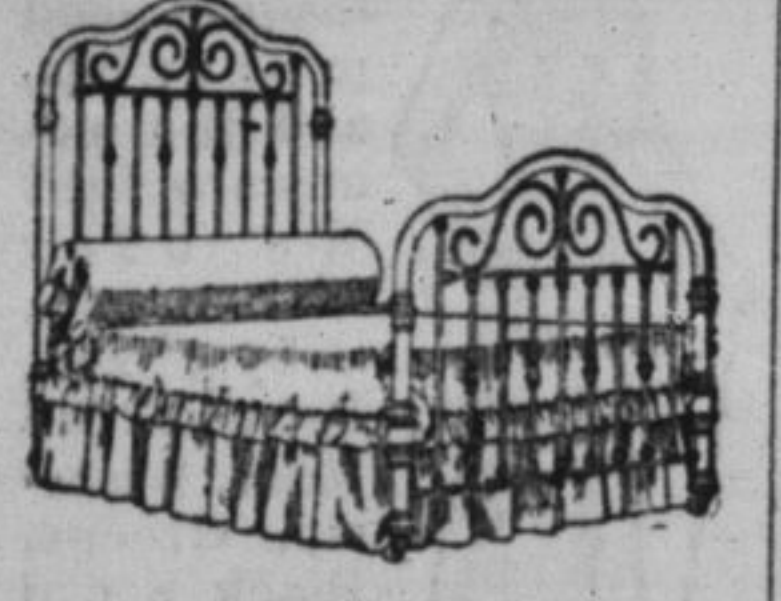

**GASOLINE ENGINES.**

A Record Order Given to the Ferro Engines.

What is probably the largest order for gasoline engines has just been placed by the W. H. Mullins company, Salem, Ohio, builders of Mullins Pressed Steel boats. The order was placed with the Ferro Machine and Foundry company, of Cleveland, and calls for 2,000 engines. It is expected by the W. H. Mullins company that considerably more than this number of engines will be ordered before the season is over.

This order is notable in that it is indicative of the great interest in motor boating which is now prevalent wherever water facilities are afforded. Scarcely a dozen years ago even motor boats were as unusual or even more so than the flying machine of to-day. Now you will find every river and stream, inland lake, bays, sounds, etc., dotted with "chug-chiggers" of every description from the palatial cabin cruisers on which large parties can be accommodated for weeks with almost every convenience down to the smallest model. Sailing, once a most popular sport, has given way very largely to motor boats, and in addition a large majority of the sailing boats now in use are equipped with engines for auxiliary power, permitting them to be used in calm as well as when the winds are favorable.

**REV. L. A. BETTS DEAD.**

Passed Away Very Suddenly at Winnipeg.

The death occurred at Winnipeg, on Friday, of Rev. L. A. Betts, well known in this district, and one of the oldest, if not the oldest, of the Methodist ministers in Canada. He was eighty-nine years of age, and before removing to the west, two years ago, after the death of his wife, he was engaged in many charges in Eastern Ontario, but the most of his life was spent in the county of Leeds. A large circle of friends will be very sorry to learn of his death.

Deceased is survived by three sons, John, merchant, of Prince Albert, Sask.; George L., secretary-treasurer of the Gordon-Ironside company, Winnipeg, and Rev. William Betts, in California. Deceased is a brother-in-law of A. M. Chisholm, of Kingston, and the latter received a telegram conveying to him the sad news.

The remains will be taken to Brockville, and the funeral will be conducted by the Masonic order. Rev. Mr. Betts was at one time chaplain of the grand lodge of Canada.
