WAS POINTED OUT BY THE FIRE CHIEF.

Present Truck in Use Will be Inspected by a Committee--Estimated Cost for New Truck and Sleigh is Given as \$1,650--Question of New Engine.

At the meeting of the fire and light committee, held on Friday afternoon, Fire Chief Armstrong pointed out to the members the need of a new ladder truck. A committee was appointed to make a thorough examination of the present truck and report as to the likelihood of its being able to fill the bill or if it could be placed into proper shape by some repairs.

Ald. Givens, the chairman, presided at the meeting, and also present were Alds. Hanley, Hoag, Fraser and McCann. The matter of securing a truck was the only matter before the committee.

The chief gave it as his opinion that the truck was absolutely necessary. The present truck had been in use for a great many years. It had been secured in the old days for a single horse and had now outlived its usefulness.

The members had in their minds the matter of securing a new fire engine and the question of whether or not there would be sufficient funds was a matter to be considered. With a service ladder truck there would also be needed a sleigh. As to the cost the chief estimated that the ladder truck would cost \$1,400 and the sleigh \$250.

The chief had the ladder truck brought down from the upper station and it was inspected on the market square by the members of the committee.

Afterwards a committee composed of the chairman, the city engineer and John Kelly was appointed to inspect the truck to see what can be done with it.
