SAVING OF WOMEN

RESULTS OF REFORMATORY COUNCIL DISAPPOINTING.

Temperate Do Well—Report on the First Six Hundred Cases Treated at the Home.

London, April 10.—The London council has been making an effort to deal with one of the worst and saddest evils in London, namely, drunkenness among women. A reformatory for women inmates was established at Framfield and great hopes were entertained as to the results that would follow.

The first report of the control committee is disappointing. The committee admits that the results have been unsatisfactory and urges further legislation. The following particulars relate to the first 600 cases treated at the reformatory:

THEATRE HAD CLOSE CALL.

Roof of Burdette's Opera House Damaged.

Brockville, Ont., April 10.—Brockville's opera house, which is being remodelled at a cost of over \$40,000, had a close shave from going up in smoke at an early hour on Sunday morning. The flames were confined to the roof of the opera house, and were extinguished before much damage was done either by smoke or water. Over 1,200 feet of hose was consumed, which, with the damage to the tower, is covered by insurance.

Planing Mill Gutted.

Brockville, Ont., April 10.—On Friday night, the large planing mill of the James Smart company, was practically gutted by fire, a large portion of the stock and equipment being destroyed. Spontaneous combustion is thought to have been the cause. The loss is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, covered by insurance.

At Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Harry Quensall stepped backward into the travelling gear of the Sorensen corporation mill, and had an arm wrenched off. He died, terribly mangled.

GIRL WAS DRUGGED IN CIVIC CIRCLES THE DAY'S EPISODES

BY A MAN WHO STOLE \$4,700 FROM HER.

A Strange Trial in New York—The Man Denies the Story of the Young Woman.

New York, April 10.—May Fleuman, a comely young woman, told a remarkable story of drugging and larceny at the trial of Jacob Bellis, of Bloomsfield, before Judge Foster, for robbery in the first degree.

Miss Fleuman, who is the daughter of Max Fleuman, of No. 265 East Broad way. She testified that she had known the defendant two years, and that in March, 1910, he gave her a demonstration of how paper money could be doubled by the use of acids and a complicated little machine, which he said was of priceless value. He made several \$10 and \$100 bills apparently on blank paper by the use of acids and the machine, and one of the so-called manufactured \$100, the witness said, she had changed in a bank without question.

"On the last day in March," said Miss Fleuman, "Bellis came to me and said he wanted to get \$10,000 at once, and that if I could raise \$5,000 he would use his acid and machine and manufacture \$10,000 for himself and \$10,000 for me. I got my father to draw \$3,100 from the bank, drew \$700 for my own use, pawned my jewelry for \$300 and raised \$680 from my friends. This made \$4,700."

"Bellis came to me and I showed him the money. He had his machine and a vase, which contained several bottles, which he said, held acids. He tried out the machine on a \$10 bill and made two \$10 bills out of one. He said everything was in satisfactory order and then mixed some of the stuff from the bottles in a bowl. How sweet it smells," he said, and he put the bowl under my nose. That is the last I remember, and when I woke up the \$4,700 was gone and about half the furniture had been taken away.

"My father got a whiff of the stuff Bellis had mixed and he, too, went to sleep."

Miss Fleuman said she kept the robbery secret, as she did not want her friends and relatives to know how she had been duped.

Bellis denied the robbery and claimed he was in Russia in March, 1910.
