PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over the World.

John Wighton, Toronto, a retired C.P.R. official, died after a short illness.

Duncan A. Morrison, a deaf mute of Hamilton, was run down by a street car and killed.

The queen has consented to be patroness of the Canadian Victorian Order of Nurses.

Carlton Street Methodists, of Toronto, have decided to stay together for at least a year.

Dr. W. P. Caven, Toronto, reported to the divisional court that he had found Michael Fraser sane.

The Spanish liner Alfonso XIII has been totally wrecked near Vera Cruz. Passengers and crew are safe.

The North Board of Education has decided to accept the offer of the government to establish a model school.

The National Lacrosse Union will continue to do without field captains and will return the teams at twelve men.

A complimentary banquet was tendered Dr. J. N. E. Brown, the retiring superintendent of the general hospital, Toronto.

Rev. Dr. Hlocks, Toronto, president of the Toronto Methodist conference has declined the call to Douglas church, Montreal.

King George has caused considerable comment by reviving the order of Queen Victoria, that no divorced persons shall be received at court.

Some uneasiness is felt in connection with the Royal Jubilee and the prevalence of the influenza epidemic, when there has been a serious recurrence.

Opponents of reciprocity attended a meeting of farmers called to discuss the question at Woodstock, and created a great deal of disorder by interrupting the speakers.

A serious uprising is reported at Canton. It is said that the Tartar general commanding the troops has been murdered, and that the city is in a state of siege.

It is estimated that six thousand London workmen are now employed for long hours each day, preparing for the coronation festivities, which will cost the state close on a million dollars. King George is in perfect health and taking the greatest interest in all the details.

The strike of the C.P.R. machinists is inevitable and as ten thousand men are affected, the situation is regarded as serious. Representations are being made, by telegraph, to Ottawa, to step in and adjust matters. The machinists from Fort William to Vancouver demand four and a half cents increase or will strike immediately.

Pass Within Ten Days.

Washington, April 10.—The democratic caucus to be held this week, is likely to ratify the Canadian agreement just as it came from the administration. The indications now are that the agreement will be approved by the democratic caucus, reported by the committee on ways and means and passed by the house, within the next ten days.

GODERICH MURDER CASES.

Who Are to be Heard at Assizes This Week. Goderich, April 10.—Sixty witnesses have been summoned by the crown in case of the alleged murder of Lizzie Anderson by Edward Jaraine. The trial, which commences to-morrow before Sir Glenholm-Falconbridge, will last for days.

The case of George Vanstone, who is alleged to have beaten his five-year-old son to death, because he could not count to twenty, is also on the list. George Tate Blackstock is crown prosecutor.

Another Murder Case.

Cobourg, April 10.—Peter White, "smoke" will prosecute and Gus Porter, Belleville, will defend in the case against H. L. Matthews, Jr., sailor, alleged to have murdered Josephine "Stramcombe, in the Bristol hotel, at the assizes here, commencing this morning.

TRIED TO KILL LANDLADY.

He Suicided When a Ball Player Intervened. Rochester, N.Y., April 10.—George Lettis, once a leading coal dealer of this city, attempted to murder Mrs. Ida Roman, forty-four years old, with whom he boarded. He fired three shots at the woman, one of which struck her in the left shoulder and set fire to her clothing. The second bullet struck a corset stay to the right of the heart. The stay dent the flesh, which was not broken. The stay, undoubtedly, saved the woman's life. Lettis pursued the woman for a block, firing all the way, until Patrick Boland, a ball player, grappled with him. Boland wrestled the man away from the woman, who produced a bottle of carbolic acid and swallowed enough of the fluid to cause his death.

FIRE A REVOLVER.

An Episode at Ticket Office in Tavistock. Tavistock, Ont., April 10.—An unknown stranger entered the Grand Trunk ticket office, this morning, in broad daylight, and demanded a ticket for Tilsonburg. As Ticket Agent Sibley, aged fifteen, handed out the ticket the man drew a revolver and demanded all the money he had in the bill. Sibley pluckily jammed down his wicket window just as the man fired, the bullet lodging in the opposite wall. Then the stranger escaped, getting no money and leaving no clue.

Big Fire in Cleveland.

Cleveland, Ohio, April 10.—In a spectacular fire here, this morning, the whole Carnegie avenue block was gutted, with a loss of one hundred thousand dollars. Several persons were narrowly rescued from the flames by firemen and policemen.
