TO ENTER LEAGUE

THE JUNIOR TEAMS TO FILE THEIR APPLICATIONS.

The Season Will Not Open as Early as it Did Last Year—Would Like to Spend the Grant as the League Sees the Needs.

The executive of the City Baseball League will meet, this evening, for the purpose of receiving applications from all junior teams who would like to enter the league. Things are well under way now and everything points to a successful season. As soon as the teams are all entered the schedule will be drawn up. Last year the season opened on May 14th, but it is not expected that it will open so early this year.

Meeting Will be Interesting.

The meeting of the executive of the Sunday School Athletic Association, which is called for to-morrow evening, will be interesting, and it is hoped that there will be a good attendance as there are several important things to be discussed. Several schools are waiting to see what means will be taken to help the financial end of the league out before they enter teams. This will be one of the important discussions.

Will Run Friday.

With the appearance of the warm weather the running fever has taken hold of those who were in line last year and several members of the Y.M.C.A. are figuring on having a work-out on Friday if the weather is warm. Interesting races were held last year and it is expected that the interest will be keener this year than ever.

Laid Over for a Week.

The petition of the City Baseball League, which was presented to the city council the other evening, asking for a grant to repair the cricket field, was laid over for the finance committee and as it does not meet until a week from Friday, nothing can be done in the meantime. Last year a grant of \$40 was given and this was used to purchase twenty loads of earth which was dumped on the grounds and left there. This was hardly satisfactory to the league and they would like this year if it would be possible to lay out the money as they see the need.

May Secure Yacht Crescent.

A Watertown, N.Y., despatch says: Negotiations are now pending which will probably result in Francis Herick, Henry Butterworth and Richard Coughlin becoming the owners of the yacht Crescent, for many years the pride of the Crescent Yacht Club, and which is about to be supplanted as the club's racer by a new boat which will represent the club in the Whig cup events at Toronto. The Crescent is now owned by W. H. Moore.

Scout News.

The Y.M.C.A. Boy Scouts, who have been confined to the gymnasium all winter, will get active in outdoor sports this week, if the weather remains fine. They will go for a run, Saturday afternoon, if the weather will permit, and it is expected that they will go out for target practice on Barriefield hill for a short time. Sunday morning they will line up at 10 a.m. and parade to Zion church for service.

Public School Basketball.

The last of the basketball games in the Public School League was played in the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium, Tuesday afternoon, between Louise school and Collegiate Institute, which resulted in a win for Collegiate by the score of 14 to 12, after a very hard fight. Both teams put up a gallant game and it was due to the aggressiveness of the winning team which gave them the victory. This gives the championship to the Collegiate, with two wins and one loss. The league provided a great deal of sport for the teams.

Will Enter Strong Team.

The office staff of the locomotive works will enter a strong team in the Mercantile Baseball League. They will hold a meeting this evening for the purpose of electing officers and organizing. SIMS QUITE SLICK

IN POOLING THE LOCAL MERCHANTS.

He Takes Rank With Rosen, the Tailor, Who "Did Up" Merchants for a Thousand Dollars Three Years Ago.

The disappearance of S. Sims, the proprietor of the Bijou theatre, furnished the principal item of discussion among business men yesterday and to-day. The means which he employed to get away with the goods were so easy as not to excite suspicion, and he was able to get away before anyone had time to realize his tactics. This is the first act of its kind to be worked on Kingston merchants since Rosen, the tailor, got away about three years ago with about \$1,000 of good Kingston money. Rosen's methods were somewhat different than Sims'. He went to the merchants on Saturday afternoon after the banks were closed and asked them to cash cheques so that he could pay his employees. The merchants all unsuspecting paid the money without any questioning. He worked this game on several merchants until the total amount reached \$1,000 and then "beat it." The merchants were wise for a while after that and then got back in the old rut again.

Sims only did what hundreds of others could do. He simply ran accounts at different places and then "made himself scarce." "Serves them right," said a citizen, yesterday afternoon, "I don't feel a bit sorry for them. Their business methods are too slack. It would be no trouble for anyone to run bills here for three or four thousand dollars and then skip out. I have had to ask different merchants for their bills in order to settle them. I received a bill at my place of business the other day for goods purchased in 1908. Merchants here seem to like to have bills outstanding."

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

It is somewhat slower constructing a steel boat than a wooden one on account of the tedious work of riveting; but the men are rushing the work with all possible speed.

THE LATE THOMAS FERGUSON.

Died on Wolfe Island, Aged Eighty-eight Years.

After a long and unselfish life Thomas Ferguson, Wolfe Island, passed to his reward on Sunday, April 9th. His end was peace, surrounded by his devoted children and fortified by the rites of the Roman Catholic church. Mr. Ferguson was born in Quebec eighty-eight years ago. When fifteen years of age he came to Garden Island, where he resided till 1897. Since then he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. F. E. Baker, Wolfe Island. His good wife predeceased him four years ago. He is survived by two sons and two daughters: John, of Garden Island; Thomas, of this city, and one niece, Mrs. Kennedy, of Chicago; also by thirteen grandchildren and two great grandchildren. The funeral was largely attended. A solemn requiem mass was sung by Rev. Father Spratt for the happy repose of his soul. The funeral arrangements were in charge of Thomas Ronan.
