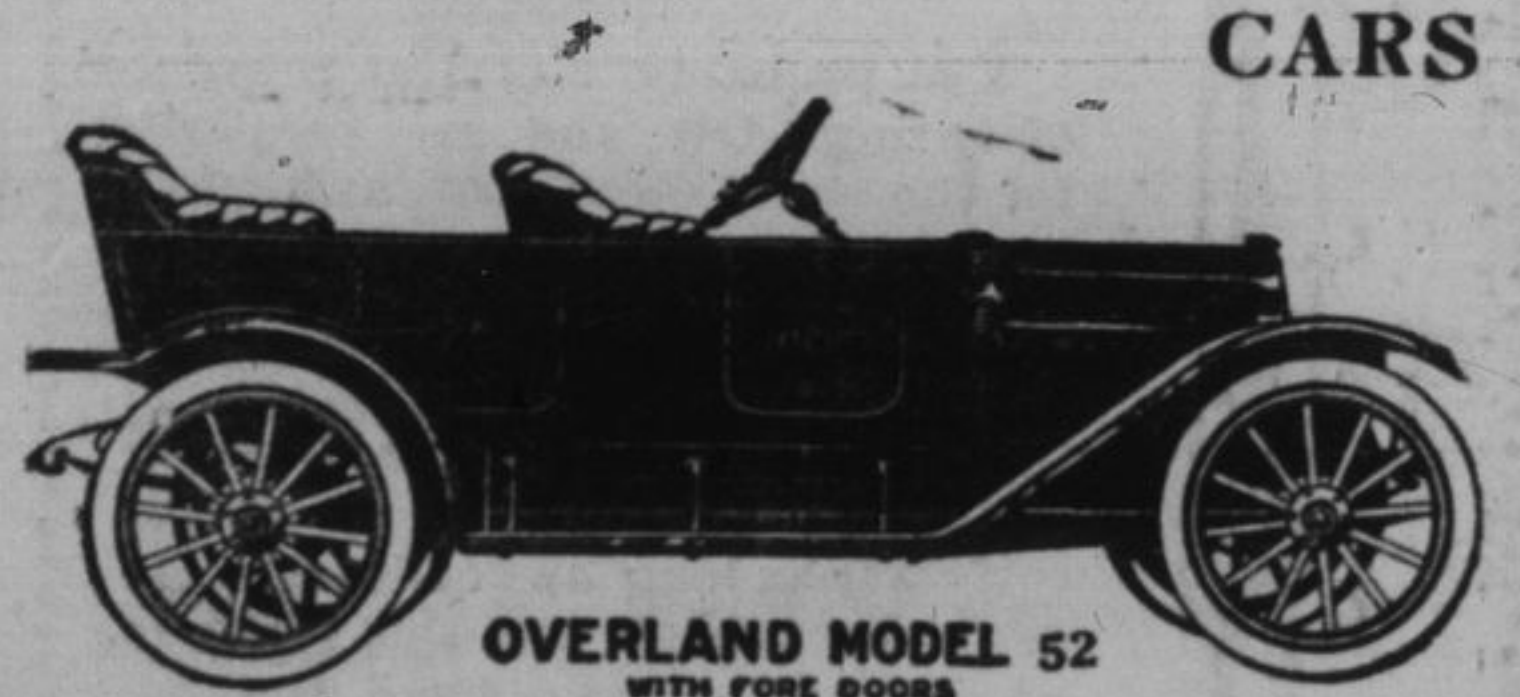

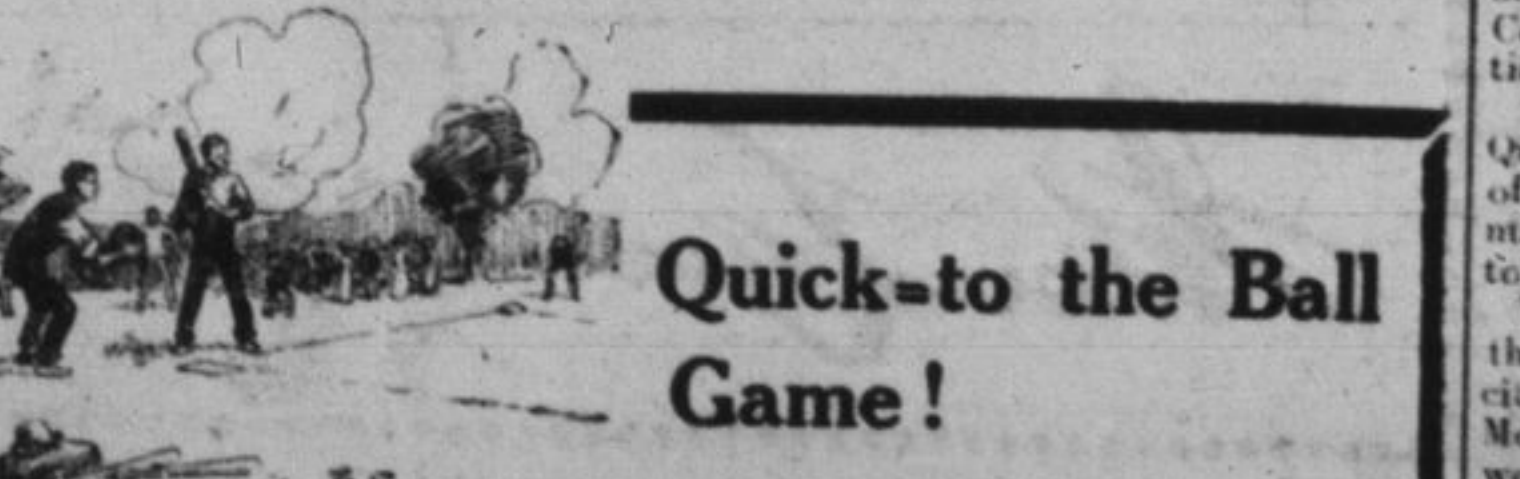

W. J. FAIR'S OPINION

OF THE TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL SITUATION.

It states it on the indifference of the Press and the People—Criticizes the Position of the Whig.

Atlantic City, N.J., April 7.—(To the Editor): He your editorial of the 5th inst. "The Civic Spirit Suffers," one hardly knows how to take the Whig on the intricate question of tuberculosis sanatoriums. Do you contend that the progressive spirit of Kingston depends upon the building up of and developing of a large hospital for consumptives in our midst? If not, why do you make such a reference to the decision of such a large majority of our citizens so lately pronounced upon. I do not for a moment presume to criticize your editorials, but a business man would like to ask the question, should not the press of Kingston share the responsibility of the situation as we find it, instead of blaming those in authority for allowing the enterprise to reach the complicated position we find it in? To my mind it was the indifference of the press and the people that encouraged Frederick Welch to conscientiously prosecute his untiring efforts until his goal was reached, then to the chagrin of himself, and those in favor of the hospital site, they and the tuberculosis committee find themselves up against the solution of a most serious problem.

Some opposition was offered to the larger scheme at its inception, but was not strong enough to guide the solicitor of, and donors of the large fund so generously given for the purpose specified. If the same public spirit had been displayed at the beginning of this worthy enterprise, which was so pronounced when the time for action arrived, all the annoyance and bad feeling in some cases would have been avoided. This is where the Whig should have shown its foresight and usefulness in directing public sentiment.

I have been placed quite unexpectedly on the committee named, to settle this all-absorbing question and do not wish to shirk my share of the responsibility. You have on this committee some of our most progressive and influential citizens, who are willing to give their valuable services to the consideration of this question, and is not fair to presume that such editorials as yours of the 5th inst., are discouraging to say the least, especially when they realize the many intricate questions involved in reaching a satisfactory settlement.

Should not the donors of this fund be asked to declare in favor of whatever course the committee decide upon, before it can be known exactly how much money is available for the purpose, and should not the committee consider the proper functions of the city, county and province, in reaching a decision.—W. HAS AN OLD DIRECTORY. References in Book in Possession of William McCammon. William McCammon, market clerk, has in his possession, an old directory of the city of Kingston, for the year 1855, taking in what was known as Hatter's Bay (Portsmouth) at that time, Williamsville, Barriefield and Watloo. The book has seventy-two pages, whereas the directory published for the city last year has 278. The directory gives the names in alphabetical order, but the streets and buildings are not given as in the directory which is made up these days.

The directory is referred to as the first directory of the old city of Cataraqui, and a few remarks are made relative to the place. There is quite a full description of the waters around this vicinity, and special attention is paid to Fort Henry and Fort Frederick.

ON CHURCH UNION

THIRD ARTICLE BY REV. DR. MILLIGAN.

A Plea to Organize the Church so That It Will be a Symbol and Witness of Christian Unity.

Rev. Dr. Milligan, Toronto. It has been remarked repeatedly by some high in educational status, if not in education, that the two great factors in national life are the university and the government. Some of us are old-fashioned enough to think that deeper and wider by far than these are the home and the church. We have forgotten neither the "Gottar's Saturday Night," nor more penetrating things Carlyle has said about the power of religion as a factor upon the life of the world.

Organize the church so that even men whose minds are far from being occupied with spiritual interests as they ought to be cannot fail to be convinced that she is no cipher in the life of the nation, and that she has other functions than services bearing upon the temporal and the eternal.

Large national interests are being dealt with by church committees on social and moral reform. They will find here an open door for such work. May their organization be such as to make that door also effective. Our duty to our polyglot population demands the union here advocated. How are we to reach our immigrants, hailing from countries with large national churches? Our multiplicity of organic centres will confuse them about the evangel; we all hold in common and therefore make supreme. Only as we make it in its central essence our organic centre can we make Christ our theme and head, so that He cannot be hid.

The interests of spiritual religion should urge all right-minded people to subordinate all considerations in things external, to secure a united front in the good fight of faith against the mammonism and sacerdotalism which are intensely striving to entrench themselves in our dominion and which have proven themselves in all history and in every land in which they have secured a strong footing to possess an inhumanity that has made countless thousands mourn. Those who are seniors now remember the seniors of their youthful days, and some of their memorable sayings. One was in connection with their opposition to Roman Catholic emancipation. Their words sounded liberal, to youthful ears, and when inquiry was made regarding their position their reply was "Give Rome the liberty she desires and you bid goodbye to your own. The presumption showing itself in Canada at the present hour may well make us pause, and may well make us ask why this silence on the part of our authorities and also on the part of hundreds of Roman Catholics, whose fathers expelled the authorities who seem just now to rule their church with a rod of iron.

What is the explanation of such migration? The dedication of organization. Such men have claimed a divine right for it in their form, glorying in it as the same yesterday, to-day and forever, a predicate we can only apply to God Himself. In proposing a change of church organization we hear the assertion that such a movement as we propose was never before heard of. Neither were telephones a hundred years ago, and many other things. Not much more than a century ago the proposition to send the gospel to the heathen was never heard of in Britain. Paul's contemporaries listened to him until he declared God was to send him far hence unto the Gentiles, and then the words came against him like a tempest, "Such a fellow is not fit to live." Yet what a blessing was such sending for us! It has been well said by Tennyson: "God fulfills Himself in many ways, Lest one good custom should corrupt the world."

Notice the word—"custom," of which we are all in danger of becoming slaves unless we put it to right use. It does not mean that by changing old methods for methods more efficient for new conditions, we abate one jot or tittle of our affection for the former order of things. On the contrary, the more matured in character we become, the deeper our memories of the blessings of bygone days. Our Lord in dying upon His cross for the sins of the world did not forget to secure means of livelihood for His mother according to the flesh. The richer in mature years we are in thought and feeling, the more tender our regard for the books and toys of youth, which we exchanged as childish things for the weapons to be wielded by full-grown men. Let us secure an organization here that will be at once a symbol and witness of Christian unity not exhibited elsewhere in our day, which will make the words in our mouth a new song.

"We are not divided. All one body we. One in hope, in doctrine. One in charity. Onward, Christian soldiers, Marching as to war, With the cross of Jesus Going on before." BANDITS WEAKENED.
