Paris, April 12.-The senate yeserday, after a lengthy discussion of the serious situation which has arisen over the champagne question, adopted a resolution in favor of the s pression of all territorial delimitations as likely to provoke dissensions between the various sections of country. A law was recently enacted excluding the department of Aube from the region the wine of which can legally be designated champagne. This has resulted in demonstrations of protest in that department.
