EXCLUDE ALL OTHERS

CANADA ALONE TO RECEIVE BENEFIT

Of Reciprocity Agreement—The Concessions to be Extended to Other Nations.

Washington, April 12.—An European government, the first to raise the point officially, has been advised by the state department that the tariff concessions offered to Canada under the pending reciprocity agreement will not be extended by the United States to other nations under the "most-favored-nation" clause of their treaties with this country. The state department declined, yesterday, to disclose the name of the country that raised the question. The discussion occupied several weeks and was purely academic as the reciprocity agreement had not become a reality.

The department's reply points out that as the reciprocity arrangement was in the nature of a bargain, the United States lowering the tariff bars in return for similar concessions, the privileges granted Canada could be obtained by other countries only through special arrangements. State department officials suggested that there are numerous reciprocity treaties existing between neighboring countries, but the United States had never claimed favored-nation treatment in connection with them.

\$800,000 DEAL IN MONTREAL.

Large Property Purchased for Erection of a New Hotel.

Montreal, April 12.—The property occupied by the W. H. Scroggie company, limited, at the corner of St. Catherine and Peel streets, was purchased yesterday by the firm of Carrick, limited, for a syndicate who propose to erect a big hotel on the site. The property has a frontage of 113 feet 6 inches on St. Catherine street, 170 feet on Peel street, and 143 feet on Dominion Square. The purchase price was understood to be in the neighborhood of \$800,000, or about \$40 a square foot. Messrs. Scroggie have a lease on the property, which expires on April 30th, 1912. The sale is subject to the leases of the Scroggie firm.

INDIANS ARE STARVING.

Scarcity of Furs in Hudson Bay District Reported.

Winnipeg, Man., April 12.—Indians in Hudson's Bay district are almost on the verge of starvation and have had to be assisted by the Hudson's Bay officers. The terribly severe winter, with the scarcity of furs in the region around Churchill, Nelson, and Trout Lake, is assigned for the state of affairs by the Rev. J. T. Wright, Nelson, who, with Rev. Mr. Leving, from Churchill, and Messrs. Leving, from Trout Lake, and Godsell, from Trout Lake, came in from the Bay and have arrived in the city.

BLACKLIST DEADHEADS.

Brantford Merchants Appoint a General Collector.

Brantford, April 12.—The Merchants' Protective association of Brantford, yesterday, reappointed H. Marsell collector for the members. Last year he collected \$2,201 from delinquent customers of the association members. A black-list will also be drawn up to prevent deadbeats from opening up accounts with new merchants after firm-flaming others.

Death of Year-old Child.

Mr. and Mrs. William Westlake, of Portsmouth, are sorely bereaved over the death of their one year and nine months' old boy who died in the Kingston general hospital, Tuesday evening, from croup, after being ill only three days. The little fellow was very bright and much loved by all who knew him. The sympathy of the many friends of the bereaved couple is extended to them. The funeral was held Wednesday morning from the parlors of the hospital, at nine o'clock.

Held Back \$11,000.

Ottawa, April 12.—Hon. William Pugsley gave evidence before the public accounts committee, this morning, regarding the dredging operations at Bathurst and Dalhousie, N.B., under investigation. He stated that the sum of \$11,000 had been held back by the department from A. and B. Loggie, the contractors, and would not be paid.

A Strange Aviator.

Dover, England, April 12.—An aviator thought to be named Prior, hitherto unknown to fame, passed over this town in a monoplane, this morning, without guard or followers on land or sea. He ascended near London, and declares he will accomplish the trip across the channel to Paris before he gives away his identity.

Cut Down by Train.

Detroit, Mich., April 12.—Frank Phelan, whose home is supposed to be in Petrolia, Ont., was run over and killed by a Grand Trunk freight train at the Joseph Campau crossing, here, last night. Thomas Joy, Phelan's companion, was also hit, and is in St. Mary's hospital.

Sheldon Was Committed.

Montreal, April 12.—C. D. Sheldon was committed for trial, this morning, on charges of embezzlement, aggregating \$35,000, in blind pool operations. He appears very nervous and will come up again on Thursday to state whether he desires a trial before a judge of a jury.

Ticket Clerk Confessed.

Woodstock, Ont., April 12.—Charles Shibley, Grand Trunk ticket clerk, at Tavistock, has confessed that his story of the attempted hold-up, on Monday, was a fabrication and that he bored a hole in the wall for a bullet hole, to substantiate his story.

May be Confined.

Ottawa, April 12.—The proclamation of June 3rd as a public holiday is not likely to have any effect upon the observance of Victoria day. It is possible that the recognition of the king's birthday may be confined to official circles only.

Returned to Her Home.

Mrs. Wesley Walroth, who has been confined to the general hospital, for four weeks, was able to return to her home, in Maberly, on Wednesday. Mr. Walroth was in the city, and accompanied her home.

INCIDENTS OF THE DAY.

THE WINE RIOTERS IN FRANCE TUESDAY.

30,000 Bottles of Champagne Smashed by Mob—Situation Graved—Growers Indignant at Law Passed—Sacked Cellars and Poured Contents into Street.

Paris, April 12.—The senate yesterday after a lengthy discussion of the serious situation which has arisen over the champagne question, adopted a resolution in favor of the suppression of all territorial delimitations as likely to provoke dissensions between the various sections of the country. A law was recently enacted excluding the department of Aube from the region the wine of which can legally be designated champagne. This has resulted in demonstrations of protest in that department.

Epernay, department of Marne, April 12.—Upon hearing the decision of the senate the leaders summoned the wine-growers to assemble at Epernay and the call was quickly answered. A big column gathered from various sections, marched through the valley, and arrived at Day before the authorities were aware that the workers had started. The rioters smashed 30,000 bottles of champagne, throwing up barricades with casks and hoisting the red flag. The column then swept down on Damery, where three establishments were sacked, gallons of wine being poured into the streets. The next stopping place was Ay, where the rioters were beginning the work of destruction when a squadron of the 31st Dragoons, which had been sent in pursuit, caught up with them, driving them out of the town. Several of the rioters were injured. But the others took up the march to Epernay.

At Epernay the populace was seething. All the troops were on foot and the approaches to the town were strongly guarded. The situation is considered very serious, and it is feared the night will not pass without much further destruction to property.

Further Disturbances.

Paris, April 12.—The minister of war has sent several thousand troops from other provinces into the district where the champagne riots took place yesterday. There were further disturbances this morning, accompanied by shooting of several officials and the destruction of valuable property.

Troops Unable to Cope.

Epernay, France, April 12.—The blood of rioters, wounded by mounted troops, who charged into them with sharp sabres, mingled with the champagne spilled into gutters by hundreds of gallons in the strike riots, continued this afternoon. The troops here are unable to cope with the situation. Rioting and bloodshed continue. The inhabitants are inflamed by the archism and demand the downfall of the government.

SIR WILFRID WILL GO.

Ottawa, April 12.—Notwithstanding the rumors about Sir Wilfrid Laurier calling off his trip to England for the imperial conference and the coronation, it was given out this morning that he had definitely booked his passage on the s.s. Virginian for May twelfth, and would go no matter what tactics the conservatives adopted regarding the reciprocity agreement.
