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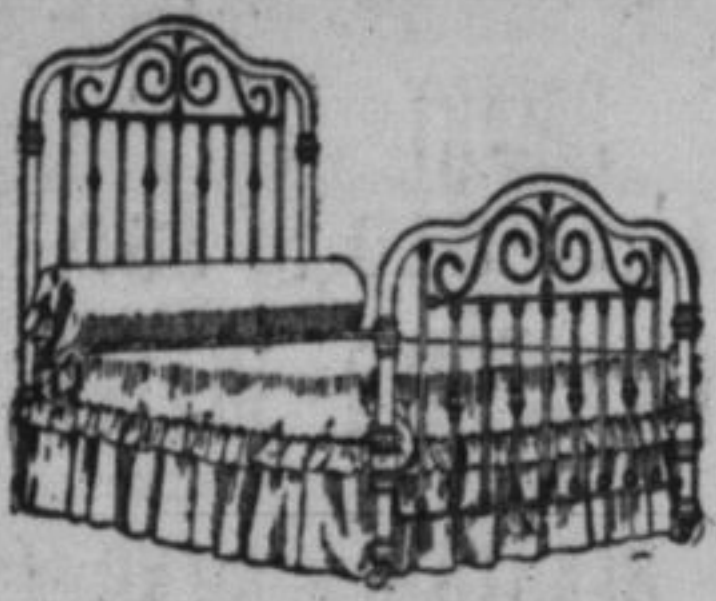

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### KINGSTON'S CONSUL

QUOTED BY SECRETARY OF STATE KNOX

In regard to reciprocity as an aid to the potato market—Consul Johnson in the *Limelight* at Washington.  
A Washington despatch says: Mr. Knox, secretary of state, has locked horns with Representative Hinds, of Maine, over potatoes. Mr. Hinds made a speech in the house, declaring that taking down the barriers against Canadian potatoes would ruin the farmers of Aroostook county, Maine. The secretary, through the bureau of trade relations, yesterday, replied: "American potatoes in Canada are fetching higher prices than Canadian potatoes. Consul Johnson, of Kingston, says Maine potatoes were sold in Canada at sixty cents a bushel, after paying freight charges of ten cents a bushel and a duty of twenty cents a bushel, when Canadian potatoes brought but sixty-three cents in Montreal. The reciprocity agreement removing the duty the market for American potatoes in Canada will be greatly enlarged."
