SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside up on the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-empt on may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.

NEW STREET LIGHTS

OFFER OF CANADIAN GENERAL ELECTRIC

Recommended for Acceptance by Light, Heat and Power Committee at Sum \$9,500—Much Discussion over the Two Tenders.

That the street lighting contract be awarded to the Canadian General Electric company, in accordance with the specifications for the same, for the sum of \$9,500.

This, in brief, was the resolution moved by Ald. Armstrong, and which was carried, at the meeting of the light, heat and power committee, on Tuesday afternoon. The recommendation goes to council.

The chairman, Ald. Elliott, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Aids. Toye, Armstrong, Hartly and Hanley.

When the question of the new arc lights was brought up by the chairman, the latter told of the trip he made to Toronto, and the visit he had made to the Canadian General Electric company, with Aid. Toye and Mr. Folger, since it had been decided that neither the tender of the Westinghouse company or the Canadian General Electric company be accepted. In the original contracts, the offer of the Westinghouse company was \$955 below that of the other company.

As a result of the deputations waiting upon the General Electric company the city had received a new price. The company's old price was \$10,245; today, the offer was \$9,500. The deputations practically made \$745 by interviewing the company, and having a straight business talk. The chairman pointed out how that in this new offer of the Canadian General Electric company, the same conditions were embodied in the contract, as in the last. These would be gone over by the manager, so as to see that all was right. The chairman considered the Canadian General Electric company had the very best lamp, as the Westinghouse lamp threw a shadow, which spoiled the light. The latter company claimed to have lights installed in cities where there was no shadow from the lights, and asked the committee to visit these places to view the lights.

Ald. Hartly pointed out that at the last meeting, both the tenders had been dropped, and he held that now both the companies should have the opportunity of making an offer. He wanted to know if the committee would accept the one tender in the face of this, for an expenditure of about \$10,000.

The chairman said that he would say "yes" as far as he was concerned. He pointed out that the lamp offered by the General Electric company was the best. The other threw a shade, and the company admitted this, although they claimed they had lights in other cities which did not throw a shade.

Ald. Hartly said he agreed with the chairman, that the one light might be better than the other, but what if the Westinghouse people were willing to knock off, say, \$1,000, on their price? However, if the chairman and the manager were decided that the rights of the Canadian General Electric company were the best suited for the city, then he would let it go at that. He considered that the other company should be given the opportunity to make another offer.

The chairman said that when the representatives of the two companies came to the city, he was very particular to see that each had a fair and square deal. The light had been put up, and each company had been given a square deal. As far as he was concerned himself, he would not accept the lights of the Westinghouse company, if that company lowered their price by \$2,000, owing to the shade thrown by the lights.

Ald. Hartly pointed out that the rights of the Canadian General Electric company were a slight shade.

The chairman said that while in Montreal, last week, he had inspected some of the lights of the Canadian General and noted the slight shade as here, but it was not nearly so much as the Westinghouse. He regarded Montreal as one of the worst lighted cities in the Dominion.

"They are improving, however," remarked Ald. Hartly.

The report of the manager, Mr. Folger, favored the Canadian General Electric lights, claiming they were superior and the cost of maintenance would be lower.

The chairman stated that after the last meeting of the committee, both the companies had been notified that no action had been taken on the two tenders.

Ald. Hartly said that he believed that the Westinghouse company could not give any lower price than they had already submitted. He believed their price was already at rock bottom. However, in the first offer of the Canadian General Electric, he was of the opinion that the company was endeavoring to get something over the city. The difference in price was so marked, he believed the company was trying to make a "scoop" on the city.

After a good deal of discussion, the motion to accept the contract of the Canadian General Electric company was accepted, all the members voting for it, with the exception of Ald. Hartly.

One hundred and fifty lights are to be installed.

The question of cheap power came before the members again, but it was decided to further consider the matter, at a special meeting, which will be called by the chairman, in the near future.
