INTERRED AT SYDENHAM.

Remains Late Miss Edith Akroyd Arrived From West.

Sydenham, April 18.—The remains of the late Miss Edith Akroyd, who died in Alberta last fall, were brought home to Brockville, arriving Sunday afternoon last. A large number of relatives and friends awaited their last respects to one they knew and arrival at the cemetery to pay their love so well in life.

On Monday morning came the sad news from Kingston of the death of Miss Mabel Pixley, second oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gardner Pixley, after only few days' illness with scarlet fever, aged sixteen years and ten months. Her parents, three sisters and two brothers, besides her aged grandmother, and host of other relatives, are left to mourn, and they will have the sympathy of all in their great grief.
