IT IS A NEW DEPARTURE. A new departure has been made in the administration of the license law. The police officers, who are observant and are expected to see that all laws are kept and respected, have laid information direct against an hotelman for selling liquor within prohibited hours.

This is the first time such a procedure has been reported in many years. Heretofore the police department has been required to lay the information through the inspector, and he assumed the direction of the case. Now, and while this new departure continues, the men who see the infraction of the law or know about it, will act independently, and it remains to be seen with what result.

One decided advantage accrues to the city. It will get a larger percentage, if it does not get all, of the fine which is imposed. In other words, the city will get out of the service of the men who are employed by it the revenues to which it is clearly entitled. When the province is the beneficiary, taking all excepting the costs, which are trifling, there is not much encouragement to work. The disposition is to leave to the provincial officials the duty of enforcing its laws.

The police department should go further and decide that it will enforce all the laws, and by-laws which make for the improvement of the city. Some years ago the council, by agreement with the police commissioners, transferred to the department a number of by-laws. They appear to be dead letters.

A PANIC AT OTTAWA.

The opposition at Ottawa is subject to conflicting emotions. Its members seem to have put themselves in a box, and they do not see how they are going to get out of it. They did not believe that any trade agreement could be made with the United States which they could accept. The agreement submitted surprised them. It was better than anything they looked for. Still it had to be opposed, as a matter of form. It could not be admitted for a moment that any good could proceed from a liberal government. In a hurry the leaders swallowed their previous record on the subject. It was a sad case, especially for Mr. Foster, who has so lately declared for reciprocity, but down it went.

Since then the party has been in distress. The medicine has been bad and there have been many evidences of this. Anything is welcomed which gives the promise of relief. There was for a time the prospect that congress would reject the pact. But the special session and the declaration of the democratic majority has settled that point. The secession of certain liberals, representatives of the rich corporations, was regarded as a hopeful sign. The government might scare. But it did not. Then the party press took straw votes, and manipulated them, and in that way undertook to terrify the government. No result. Something had to be done, so the about went up that the party wanted more information, and it came in returns, statements, and blue books, a deluge of it. Balked again. Obstruction was threatened. The premier wanted to head a deputation to the coronation of the king and he could not go unless he abandoned reciprocity. Still no visible effect. The opposition members took turns in wailing over their misfortunes. It was a touching sight, but the ministers were obdurate. Lastly comes the announcement that Ottawa is a kind of pest station, that "disease is rampant," that, according to the Mail, there are "twelve hundred cases of typhoid fever this year, followed by diphtheria and small-pox." Will that create a stampede? We shall see.

OTHER SIDE OF THE CASE.

Canon Roy, chancellor of the diocese of Montreal, answers Bishop Farthing, in behalf of the Roman Catholic church, on the marriage question. He wonders at the comment that has been passed upon the judgment recently rendered on the Hebert case, since the church has for years considered as null marriage of two Catholics contracted before a Protestant minister, "and it," said he, "one will only take the trouble to search the archives he will easily see that the recent judgment is in every way conformable to well-established jurisprudence in our province."

For the Roman Catholic church marriage is a sacrament, and consequently a thing essentially sacred and religious. It is a sacrament and a contract at the same time. It is for the church to determine the validity of the sacrament and to declare whether, in a marriage, it is validly or invalidly administered. The church cannot be blamed if her laws collide with the laws in marriage in certain countries. She cannot accommodate her rulings to the laws of these countries. "If this is the end aimed at in certain quarters," said the canon, "those making the pretensions are giving themselves much useless trouble." All the church claims is the right to look after the administration of a sacrament in the case of her own children, and the canon does not see in this anything that is contrary to civil or religious liberty and equality. The impediment to mixed marriages is recognized by the code of the province of Quebec, and the church insists upon the rights which have been guaranteed by the constitution of the country, rights that were protected in the treaty by which Canada was ceded to Great Britain, and rights that have been covered by all the constitutions that have been written, including the act of Confederation.

Canon Roy remarks that it is surprising the constitutional rights of the Roman Catholic church should be challenged at a time when they (the French Canadians), were being called upon to show the greatest loyalty to the empire. Apart from that there was a decided advantage in permitting the marriage of certain persons to be celebrated by priests of the church to which they belong. In the matter of marriages it is better that each shall remain within his own fold. The contrary practice leads to discord, dissension and hatred.

This is the summing up of the church on a question of the day. There is nothing to add, save that Rev. Mr. Timberlake, who married the Heberts, writing to the press, says he acted on a license which was issued by the province on the authority of the lieutenant-governor, and the state should see that its interests are duly and properly preserved. A license can only be secured in Quebec from a notary whose duty it is to act in the presence of two witnesses, each of whom must sign a bond to the value of \$500 that he knows of no cause why the marriage should not take place. The law that permits a marriage should not later permit its annulment.

TALKING THROUGH HIS HAT.

The Kingston Force Gained What it Sought.

Regarding an article printed in a Kingston newspaper to the effect that the Kingston force defeated the Ottawa force in the war game between a force with headquarters at Ottawa and one with headquarters at Kingston, which recently terminated, a prominent officer of the militia department stated to the Journal that in the war game no decision is given. "Neither side can claim the victory," he said. "It is impossible to compel actual war conditions, and the movements are carried on simply for the experience obtained by those who take part in them. Criticism is made of each movement by chief of the general staff, Major-General Mackenzie, and the director of military operations, Lieut.-Col. Paley, but no decision is made as to the winner or loser."

Must Have the Best.

Toronto Globe. In the building of this final Welland canal we must be sure we are right before we go ahead—sure as to the route as well as the style of locks to be used. The science of canal-building has been revolutionized by the construction of the Panama and the operations of the lift locks on the Trent Valley canal. Mr. Graham says his engineers assure him that on what is known as the Jordan route a canal can be built giving twenty-five feet of water, with locks so constructed as to permit of deepening to thirty feet at some future time. Vessels could be raised from the Lake Ontario to the Lake Erie level by two lifts of 150 feet each. The saving in time as compared with the slow process of passing in and out of the twenty-six locks on the existing canal would average probably twelve hours on the trip from Port Colborne to Kingston and return. Mr. Graham is quite right in desiring to obtain the best men available on the continent to consult with his engineers as to the practicability of this starting method of saving time. BOATS TO BURN OIL

YEARLY SAVING OF \$160,000 WILL BE EFFECTED.

Pacific Mail Steamship Company's Vessels Having Their Coal Burners Changed to Oil Burners.

San Francisco, Cal., April 20.—Announcement is made that the Pacific Mail Steamship company has ordered its three big freighters, the City of Para, the Pennsylvania, and the Arctec, converted from coal burners to oil burners. On Thursday the City of Para will be taken to the Union iron works in order to have oil burners installed. As soon as the work on the City of Para is finished the Pennsylvania and the Arctec will be taken to the iron works for the same purpose. H. P. Schwert in stated recently that his engineers had reported in favor of the change from coal to oil and had estimated that the change would save the company \$160,000 a year.

It is evident that the Pacific Mail steamship company intends to continue in the Panama business, and it is believed that if the oil burning experiment with the freighters bears out the estimates of the engineers, the seven passenger steamships of that company will be changed from coal to oil burners also.


