

AUDIENCE DELIGHTED

WITH THE ACTING OF MISS MARGARET ANGLIN

At the Grand Last Evening—Canada's Leading Actress Was Charming in "Green Stockings."

Miss Margaret Anglin, the Canadian actress, who occupies a high place among theatrical stars, and who was pronounced by the famous Sarah Bernhardt, as the best she had seen in America, appeared at the Grand last evening, before a very large and fashionable audience in an enjoyable English comedy entitled "Green Stockings," and created the same feeling of delight as she did on her former visits here. Miss Anglin first appeared here in 1897, when she was about twenty-three years old. She was then James O'Neil's leading lady in "Virginius," and those who saw her predicted that the daughter of the sometime speaker in the Canadian House of Commons, would have a brilliant stage career. In December, 1903, Miss Anglin appeared here in a comedy with Henry Miller. Since that time she has confined herself largely to emotional and tearful acting. Kingston, however, knows her better in comedy, and so had not a chance to appreciate her versatility. Her audience, last night, pronounced her delightful in the part of Celia Faraday, the eldest daughter of an English gentleman, who creates much amusement in her endeavor to avoid wearing the green stockings at a younger sister's wedding. "Green Stockings," as is pretty well known, is built around a practice in England that whenever a younger daughter marries before the eldest, the latter shall wear green stockings at the wedding.

H. Reeves-Smith, the noted English actor, is Miss Anglin's chief support, as "Col. Smith." He has been seen in Kingston on several occasions, first in "The Tyranny of Tears," with Miss Beverly-Robinson, also a Canadian actress.

The whole company is excellent, and presents a comedy whose charm is in its naturalness.

In an interview Miss Anglin said: "Playing a role, for one season, if it is one to which an actress is well fitted and in which she feels she is doing good work, makes her extraordinarily fond of it. Night after night she will find some new place in which she can perfect herself, until finally,

towards the end of the season, the polishing and development process should have resulted in the attainment of something like perfect characterization—but after one season a star is apt to feel that the continuation of the same role for six or eight weeks becomes a little wearying, and unless great care is exercised she may possibly get into a rut, and go through her part in a desultory, not to say perfunctory, manner. What I would like to do would be to have a repertoire, and then without any preliminary announcement go out before my audience and say, 'To-night we play this, or to-night we play that,' anything that suits my mood."

On Monday night, April 24th, at the Grand, the latest comedy success, "The Kissing Girl," direct from its phenomenal run of nearly 250 performances at the Cort Theatre, Chicago, will reveal the charms of its talented star and the beauty of a cast of principals and chorus said to be of great loveliness. POINTERS FOR KINGSTON.

Some Things They Do in Other Cities.

Here are a few things they do or do not do in other cities:

In Columbus, Ohio, householders must dampen ashes before the cans are set out.

In Scranton, Pa., garbage cans must be tightly covered and must be clean and dry on the outside before they are set out for collection.

In Cleveland, Ohio, the officials of the street railway have private trolleys and coaches, also buffets.

In Boston nearly every one wears gloves at work or play the year round. Some women even wear gloves as well as eyeglasses in the surf at Nantasket and Revere Beach.

In Savannah shrimps are the chief article on the free lunch bill of fare.

In New Orleans the gin fizz is the most popular drink and it isn't like any other gin fizz on earth. The bartenders have negro assistants who do nothing but shake gin fizzes. They also sell absinthe frappe at the soda fountains in the Crescent city.

In Wheeling, W. Va., the saloons are never closed except from midnight Saturday till five o'clock Sunday morning. This is not the law, but the regulation of a former mayor, the intent being to rid the streets of drunken men before women going to early Sunday mass are abroad.

TO PREVENT CRIMES

NEW BRITISH ALIEN BILL INTRODUCED.

Right of Asylum is Still Accorded, But Refugees Must Have Permits to Carry Firearms.

London, April 20.—As a result of many recent crimes by foreigners in the East End of London, Winston Churchill, the home secretary, introduced a new aliens bill in the House of Commons. The measure does not touch the question of alien immigration, which will be permitted to go on the same as heretofore, but it is designed wholly for the prevention of crime.

The bill increases the penalties of an alien who, under the existing act, is deported as a criminal, but can return. It also requires securities for the good behavior of an alien in certain cases, but an alien who has lived in the united kingdom for five years is exempt from this liability.

In order to secure more frequent application of the law providing for the expulsion of these alien criminals, courts, which, in sentencing criminals to imprisonment, do not recommend their deportation, will have to furnish a reason therefor.

The right of asylum to those seeking refuge from oppression and persecution, abroad is still accorded.

A bill in regard to the carrying of pistols will be introduced in the House of Lords shortly. It will require aliens to obtain a special police permit for the carrying of firearms.
