

Even Kingston would be surprised at the many beautiful and costly residences here. Great attention is paid to road-building. The main stone road, is perhaps the best in Canada. In the summer season hundreds of automobiles pass daily. The climate is singularly mild. Lake Ontario never freezes over at this point and only once during the past winter did the mercury drop below zero. We have very little snow and as a rule it stays only a few days. Commercially we are of some importance. An immense quantity of fruit is shipped all over Ontario and Quebec, and to the far west. The majority of the growers have organized themselves into co-operative companies; one of the new ones starting did a business of \$156,000 last year, shipping 130 carloads to Winnipeg alone. Good peach orchards are worth from \$1,000 to \$1,500 and acre, depending upon the location and buildings. This seems to be a paradise for real estate men, no less than ight here, and even fruit farmers take a hand in it; consequently property hanges hands quickly and good lands and orchards selling at higher prices. Canning factories are contracting for tomatoes, strawperries and raspberries at prices twenty per cent, in advance of last year, so that the fruit growers who expected to be hard hit by reciprocity may not fare so badly after all, but the early peaches will keep us guessing. Prospects look favorable for a good crop of all kinds of fruit.
