NOT FIT TO DRINK

THE OTTAWA WATER IS VERY BAD.

And Causes Talk in Commons.—Hon. William Harty Supports Extension of Bounties on Iron and Steel.

Special to the Whig. Ottawa, April 21.—Before the debate on reciprocity was resumed in the commons yesterday, Hon. Mr. Fielding had on the table a copy of the commercial treaty just negotiated between Great Britain and Japan.

Col. Sant Hughes once again declared that the water used in the house was not fit to drink and asked the minister of public works if he could produce a certificate of its analysis.

Mr. Pugsley said he had the certificate and would produce it to-morrow.

Mr. Sealey, Wentworth, asked Mr. Pugsley if it was the intention of his department to deepen and widen the Burlington Beach canal, in Hamilton harbor. The minister replied that the matter was engaging the earnest attention of his department.

Mr. Owen (Northumberland) wanted to know what the government intended to do about the large cracks both in the floor and walls of the new Victoria museum building.

He declared that these cracks were over an inch in width and he for one did not propose to pay money for such work on the part of the contractors. This building has cost over one and a half millions and the public are not getting value for their money.

It should not be taken over from the contractors in such a condition, he said. The minister of public works said he was not aware that there were any cracks in the floors, but he knew of the one in the wall. He had called his chief architect's attention to it and the building is now being examined.

Dr. Sproule said the whole matter had been published in different newspapers and it was rather singular that the minister had not deemed it advisable to investigate before this.

Hon. George E. Foster reviewed the formation of the imperial conference and secretariat from the first time such a commission was held. He pointed out that such a conference was expressly for the purpose of affording each colony an opportunity of making representations as regards their demands. So far this government has not made known what requests they expect to submit for consideration. He thought that if they were to make any they should first have them discussed in parliament.

At a liberal caucus held yesterday it is understood E. M. Macdonald asked to have the bounties on iron and steel extended for another eighteen months. It is believed that he was strongly supported by Hon. Mr. Harty, of Kingston, and Hon. J. R. Stratton, Peterboro. The matter was taken under consideration by Hon. Mr. Fielding.

HOW HE MET DEATH.

Patrick Gahan Likely Beating Way on Train.

Martin Gahan, brother of Patrick Gahan, the man who was found dying beside the railroad tracks at Collins Bay, on Wednesday morning, arrived in the city, Thursday afternoon, accompanied by his wife. When seen by a representative of the Whig, at the Windsor hotel, Mr. Gahan did not have much to say regarding his brother. His brother was not found of work, and at the time he met his death he was beating his way westward on a train.

While in Montreal he was employed as a laborer. He was not married and Martin was the only brother. He had no sisters. Mr. and Mrs. Gahan returned to Montreal this morning, taking the remains with them.

ORGANIST RANG CHURCH BELL.

People in Portsmouth Thought Fire Was Raging.

The whole village of Portsmouth was startled, last evening, by the ringing of the bell on St. John's church, about eleven o'clock, and thought a fire was raging in the village. After the concert the organist remained behind to practice for a while. When he arose to go, he blew out the lights, but when he reached the door he found it was locked. When he found his means of exit he observed the rope of the bell hanging in front of him, and promptly proceeded to ring it with all his might. Eventually some one released him.

Against Bill to Pay Employees Fortnightly.

Ottawa, April 21.—Railway companies put up a vigorous fight in senate railway committee this morning against the bill introduced by Frederick Martin, M.P., and which passed commons, to compel payment of railway men every fortnight instead of every month as at the present. William Wainwright, of the G.T.P., asserted that the change would cost the company fifty thousand a year. A. R. Croftman for the C.P.R., said that eighty thousand employees of that road were quite satisfied with the present system. Further consideration was deferred until Wednesday.
