FANCY DRESS BALL

GIVEN BY THE HORSE ARTILLERY OFFICERS

In the City Hall on Wednesday Night—The Scene Was Brilliant—The Dance Continued Until After Daylight Had Broken.

On Wednesday evening, one of the most brilliant balls ever held in Kingston was given in the city hall, by Lieut.-Col. H. E. Burstall and officers of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. The scene in the ball room was unusually striking, owing to the beauty and variety of the fancy costumes worn by the guests and the extensive decorations of the hall. The platform, with its background of flags, surrounding the royal coat-of-arms, was decorated with palms and flowers, and arranged for the bridge players. The windows were curtained with Union Jacks, and the walls hung with crossed swords, and red and blue bunting, the colors of the R.C.H.A. Many colored pennants were strung at intervals from the walls to the centre of the ceiling.

Never before did the old hall present such a brilliant and magnificent appearance, and much credit is due the officers in charge. Drapings of red and white bunting in the halls and the rifles which lined the bannisters added greatly to the military appearance of the decorations. In one corner of the landing at the top of the stairs was a twelve-pound gun, and in the opposite corner a huge trophy of harness and stock was displayed.

Ontario hall, where supper was served, was effectively decorated with blue and white bunting. The guests sat down at sextette tables, which were prettily arranged with flowers and ferns.

The orchestra of the R.C.H.A., which was stationed on a platform in the left hand corner of the room, furnished their usual excellent music for the programme of twenty-eight dances. There was a great deal of fun and confusion among the dancers until they unmasked at the end of the fifth dance, when many amusing mistakes of identity were discovered. The last two numbers were danced in daylight and the dance broke up shortly after five o'clock.

MISHAP TO THE LITTLE STEAMER SALLY.

Two of the Crew Were Almost Drowned—They Were Picked Up by one of the Vessels Nearby.

Two men had a very thrilling experience of Point Frederick, Thursday forenoon, and a narrow escape from drowning. The men are Engineer Reynolds, and Fireman Wilbur, of the steam yacht Nokomis, owned by W. H. Nichols, of Howe Island. The men were on board the little steamer Sally which was sunk in an accident.

The Sally was towing the yacht Nokomis, up the river to the Davis dry-dock, and when near Point Frederick, so it is stated, arrangements were being made to release the vessels. They were side by side, and it is stated that a mistake in handling the lines was responsible for the accident. The bow tow line was thrown off first instead of the stern, and thus caused the Sally to turn over, and fill with water. Reynolds and Wilbur became mixed up in the wreckage, and had quite a time of it, until they were picked up by one of the vessels in port. The men had a very narrow escape, but were not injured. They had a nice cool bath, but soon recovered from the shock.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years, or homesteader may by within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$200 per acre. Must reside up in the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

Persons who have exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-empt may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
