FLURRY IN THE WEST. One has to read the full report of the Edmonton meeting, called in the interest of the reciprocity agreement, in order to understand its import. The meeting was not divided upon the trade agreement and the nature of it. There was a division of opinion in the meeting, but it had reference to the attitude of Hon. Mr. Oliver to the Rutherford government and the contract it made with the Alberta and Great Waterways railway.

A resolution had been presented with regard to the trade agreement, and incidentally it expressed confidence in the minister of the interior. An amendment was submitted. It approved of the reciprocity pact, but found fault with Mr. Oliver, because he had throttled a railway that was proposed to build into the north country.

The mover of this resolution, Judge Harlan, was aided by Joseph Adair, and he charged that Mr. Oliver had entered a political intrigue to overthrow the Rutherford government. This statement the minister of the interior pronounced a lie, and for a time there was a scene, but it ended with the original motion being carried by a sweeping majority.

The incident has been regarded as important, because the attack on Mr. Oliver was made by liberals. The members of a party occasionally quarrel among themselves, and with the very best results. It brings about a clearing of the air, and the dissidents have a chance to assert their power, go into opposition or become reconciled. The half dozen kickers in Edmonton can safely leave the political future of Mr. Rutherford to the premier himself. He retired from an intolerable position, but he is a supporter of the Sifton government.

APOLOGIES WEIE IN ORDER.

Mr. Taylor has not yet retracted the slander which he uttered about the commissioners of the Transcontinental railway. These have a car which they use on their inspection tours. They cannot get along without it. The car is supplied with the food the men must eat if they would live. Mr. Taylor takes up the blue book, figures up what is charged against the commission, and charges that its members are spending the money of the people in riotous living.

The chairman of the commission is a temperance man, and it is made to appear that his practice, belies his preaching. When challenged by the premier, and given a chance to reflect, Mr. Taylor shouts: "Bring down the accounts and I will vouch for the fact that nine-tenths of the expense is for champagnes and liquors for that car, and they pay it from Bate & Co."

Mr. Foster is one of the rioting party, and he and Mr. Lemieux, and Dr. Sproule do their best to slander the Transcontinental commissioners. Now what is the fact? That not a dollar of the expense of the commission is for liquors or "lush," as Mr. Taylor terms it, and that the slander is without justification. The accounts of the commission are carefully audited. They must be passed by the public accounts' committee. It should be impossible for any item to pass which is objectionable. And, yet, these "honourable gentlemen," members of his majesty's opposition, can take up the time of the house in dealing with fiction and in giving it an offensive and abusive application.

It is remarkable that the leader of the party was absent when those outrageous episodes occurred. Did he know they were coming and did he make himself scarce in order to escape the odium, which was attached to it? Mr. Foster is not ashamed of his part in the incident, but then he does not appear to blush over the misconduct of anyone on his side of the house.

WANTED, A BOOSTER'S CLUB.

Let us have a booster club. A what? A booster club, an institution which will be composed of men, and women, too, who will lay all jealousies aside and work for the welfare of the city. What is the matter with some people? Several things. They haven't any faith in themselves and they haven't any faith in their neighbors. Nothing that can be named or suggested is any good. That is the first great and chief drawback. It has to be removed. How? By the cultivation of the grace of friendship, the virtue of self-forgetfulness, or the advantage of mutual interest.

Take into consideration any place in which the spirit of progress is apparent. The people are pulling together. The merchant, the manufac-

turer, the professional men and the laymen, can confer without any seeming want of confidence. Some men are fertile in imagination. The vision of others is clear. The confidence of still others is a striking quality. Candid criticism, but not destructive, is the possession of a different set. It is when all these get into agreement, exercising the characteristics that distinguish them, that something tangible is produced, something whose development means public good.

It is when one reads the reports of various public bodies that he becomes annoyed. He sees the lack of harmony on the great issues of the day. The Knockers' Club has had its reign long enough. It is time it gave way to the Boosters' Club. Its members should be in the council, the school board, the board of trade, everywhere, and they should raise the optimistic note. The men of capital who may be seen on the road in all directions, are driven away by every exhibition of distemper. They reason that when the men who are here knock each other they would have no hesitation in knocking the stranger, and he keeps away.

The advertisement which the Exploration company is giving the city is hurtful, whatever the cause of it. It is that the council will not execute and carry out the agreements which it makes. The matter came up in the council on Monday evening, and was attended with some recrimination. To what purpose? Any? No good can come from the attack of any one on the mayor. He was advised, it is said, not to sign the contract. If the council wanted him to act it could have called a special meeting for the purpose. It acted in haste, and some of its members repent at leisure. The result is an alleged breach of faith, and it is an unpleasant thing to contemplate.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mrs. Thornley, of London, has submitted the evidence in support of her charge that there is immorality in the public schools and the Ministerial Association has endorsed her indictment. Mrs. Thornley appears to have been vindicated.

The postmaster-general of the United States predicts a surplus this year. He began his term of office with a deficit of \$17,500,000. He is, therefore, giving proof of his capacity as an administrator. Hitchcock is a name to conjure with.

Before saying anything further on the tuberculosis hospital question the Whig has been awaiting the action of a committee with regard to the site. Time is going by, and so far as one can see little is being done. Now this won't do, gentlemen.

The editor of the White Ribbon

Bulletin, Mrs. Gordon, of Ottawa, has very little hope of legislation affecting the lives and morals of the children until the women are given the franchise. Then the law will be ideal and the morals of the people will be the very best.

Parties are changing. Here and there, from time to time, men change their politics for personal reasons. The question of patronage is the deciding cause. Their loss is the party's gain and the change in their allegiance cannot come about too soon.

PAID GREAT PRICE

For a Valued Bible—Highest in World Yet. New York, April 27.—Gutenberg's Bible, a superb impression from the types of the father of printing, one of the seven vellum volumes of its kind in the world, was bought for \$50,000 last night by Henry E. Huntington, of California, at the sale of the library of the late Robert Hoe. This is the highest price ever paid for any printed volume in the history of man, and is practically double the sum which stands next to it, the \$24,700 which J. Pierpont Morgan gave for the psalter from the same press.

THE PLAGUE IN INDIA.

It is Alarming, But Will Not Interfere With Durbar. London, April 25.—Replying to a question in the house of commons Mr. Montague, parliamentary secretary for the India office, admitted that the officers were alarmed over the recrudescence of the bubonic plague in the provinces of Agra and Oudh, India, but they did not think it would interfere with the Durbar in Delhi when King George will be crowned as emperor of India. The deaths from the plague in February, he said, were 13,588, and in March they increased to 95,888.

PRIEST HAD SIGN REMOVED.

Advertised Sermon on "Rome and the Bible." Collingwood, April 27.—Considerable excitement has been aroused here by the action of the chief of police in removing from a public position a large notice board announcing a sermon by the Rev. G. F. Assier, of the Christian church, on "Rome and the Bible." It is understood that it was the result of a demand by the priest at the town hall, and that a member of the council ordered its removal by the police.

Hard on the Hoboes.

Montreal Gazette. The judicial committee of the privy council has upset the judgment of an Ontario court which awarded damages to a man who was injured while riding without authority on a railway train. The privy council held that while a railway by its sale of a ticket contracted to safely carry the holder, it had no contract with a man who had no ticket and was in fact a trespasser, who might have been prosecuted for his act. Occasionally it pays a railway to fight a damage claim. It may get the case before a court which gets at the sense of the situation.

CASH REGISTER CHECKS CAN BE USED

Dear Sir—To our attention that many storekeepers in Kingston have, for some reason or other, been warned against using their Cash Register Checks—warned against what we cannot understand. Any owner of a Cash Register can issue the printed checks to his customers with a discount on same, providing the electro on the register prints as follows:— "This check is good for 5 per cent. of its face value at my store at any time."

Never Any Objection.

There has never been any objection raised to the following clause on the same cash register check:— "\$10.00 in checks would be worth 50c." The above, of course, would apply where a merchant wished to give a discount of that amount. He can change the rate of discount to suit himself. You will see from the above that a merchant wishing to give a discount has lots of latitude, as any customer would thoroughly understand it.

The Law Allows It.

We consider that we have interpreted the law correctly relative to Trading Stamps, etc., and the above electro is according to the interpretation of our solicitors, and which we have used for years, and which we are prepared to defend. Many merchants are realizing the great value to them of handing the customer a printed receipt for all

purchases, as all successful business is founded on getting a receipt, proven by the fact that the largest and most successful concerns in the world realized this early in their history—that the only way to get all their money and keep a customer satisfied was to give a receipt for every transaction. The same principles that apply to a large business apply directly to any business, large or small, and many merchants are beginning to realize this. The automatic printed receipt issued by a National Cash Register has proven itself the quickest and safest, as it cannot be changed.

Wording That is Illegal.

However, the merchant is not permitted to have this printed receipt read something like the following:— "Return \$10 in these checks and get 25c in trade." The check must read as we have outlined it above, but one will quickly see that a merchant will derive as good a benefit, if not better, as if redeeming their checks (if they wish to) at any time, no matter what the amount. Though few may take advantage of this privilege, still they are entitled to it. So says the law.
