WIFE TO BARE PAST

TO SAVE HER HUSBAND FROM THE GALLOWS.

She Admits Her Unfaithfulness—Her Husband Would Not Allow Her to Testify and Injure Her Character.

Albany, N.Y., April 27.—Gov. Dix has granted a respite until the week beginning June 26th to Charles L. Green, who was to have been executed at Clinton prison next Tuesday for the murder of his fourteen-year-old step-daughter, at New Scotland, Albany county, in July, 1910. The respite was granted despite the fact that Green refused to sign a petition which was submitted to the governor, asking for the commutation of the sentence of death of life imprisonment, saying he was resigned to his fate and anxious to pay the death penalty. The governor has denied this application.

The respite was granted on the affidavit of Mrs. Green, who was also shot by her husband, at the time her daughter was killed, and is for the purpose of permitting Green's counsel to present newly discovered evidence to the court.

Mrs. Green, in her affidavit, confesses that her husband discovered a few days before the shooting that she had been unfaithful to him, and she attributes this confession as the real cause of the tragedy. She swears that her husband would not permit her "to testify to anything that would help him and hurt me," and that he told her that "he would rather die in the electric chair than have the people know—or say a single word against me—or my character. I feel that in a way I am responsible for all that he has done and the burden rests heavily upon me."

GOVERNMENT INSURANCE.

New British Bill Based on Contributionary Principles.

London, April 27.—The government insurance bill will, according to present arrangements, be introduced by Mr. Lloyd-George, the chancellor of the exchequer, next Monday. It is understood to be based on the contributory principles, that is, the insurance funds are to be provided by joint contributions from the employers the employed and the state.

This is the principle adopted in the German scheme, which has been worked now for many years with conspicuous success.

Abolishes All Bars.

Ottawa, April 27.—The council of the village of Gatineau Point, with a population of 2,000, decided last night to abolish all the bars. Eight hotels and one shop license are affected. They will be given three months to sell out.

Rev. Mr. Neilson, Lennoxville, Ont., has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Winchester Baptist church, and will preach his first sermon on May 21st.

Death Sentence Commuted.

Winnipeg, April 27.—His excellency Earl Grey, yesterday, agreed to the request for the commutation of the death sentence passed upon Nicholas Bilawos. In reply to the deputation, which repeated the request contained in the petition, his excellency said that he had received from Ottawa the recommendation of the minister of justice for a commutation of the death sentence, and it was with pleasure that he acquiesced in the commutation.

Beavers Too Destructive.

Regina, Sask., April 27.—Beavers have become so numerous and are destroying so much fine timber around Oxbow, that settlers are appealing to the government to exterminate them.


