SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to pay for homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emptive may enter for a purchase of 100 acres in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 100 acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

CARE OF CHILDREN

BY MEDICAL INSPECTION IN SCHOOLS.

Dr. George Auden, Birmingham, England, Delivered an Instructive Illustrated Lecture at Queen's University.

Speaking on the subject of medical inspection of school children, and pointing out how the work in the old country schools was carried out, Dr. George Auden, of Birmingham, England, delivered a most interesting and instructive lecture on Friday evening, in the biological laboratory at Queen's university. The lecture was illustrated with lantern slides, showing the schools, and how the children are cared for. Principal Gordon presided, and introduced Dr. Auden to the audience. Dr. Auden has been in Toronto, where he attended the meetings of the Ontario Educational Association, on the invitation of the minister of education.

Principal Gordon extended Dr. Auden, a warm welcome to Queen's, and referred to the all-important subject of the care of the children. He pointed out that the welfare of the community depended upon the welfare of the children.

Dr. Auden proceeded to point out the way in which children are cared for in the old country, and draw the attention of the audience, as to just how far these same principles could be carried out in Canada, so as to have healthy children. He referred to cases of tuberculosis, and said that the three things to be considered were fresh air, rest, and food. Prevention was found to be far better than cure. The great object was to get the children on a higher plane. Medical inspection had been found to give good results. Pictures were shown on the canvases of the outdoor schools for tuberculosis patients; the speaker pointing out that one of the most important facts was the need of sleep. A great evil, that of expectorating on the sidewalk was referred to.

Care of the teeth was also touched upon. It was one of the most important problems in England. It had been found that ninety-six per cent of the children in the schools required dental attention. Good sound teeth were essential to good health. The speaker was of the opinion that in this respect, the people in Canada made a far better showing than the people in England.

Cleanliness was also taught the children, who were provided with baths, and this worked well.

Attention was drawn to the special attention given people who were crippled. Particular pains were taken to see that they received such a training as would demand a good position, in spite of the fact that they were crippled. Physical exercise for the children was not forgotten.

The lecturer reviewed many interesting matters, well known to those present. The pictures shown on the screen were good, and the lecture was very much enjoyed.

At the close, on motion of Dean Ellis and F. G. Lockett, a vote of thanks was tendered to Dr. Auden.
