To Check Tuberculosis—An Ottawa Comment Upon Opposition to General Hospital Site for Sanitarium.

Ottawa, April 29.—(To the Editor): There has been much worthy work done in Kingston in the past to stay the spread of tuberculosis and the more widespread interest and effort, the more need was felt of a municipal sanitarium. Money has been collected for such a purpose and land is available for a site on the hospital grounds. Also some hundreds of human beings known to be affected in varying degrees and kind are waiting as it were, their chance of life or death, till it is built.

of those awakened to the danger of uncontrolled tuberculosis in the community. What then has happened to prevent the building of this so- much-needed sanitarium. Some headlocks seem to be holding back the life-saving crew who have been trying to man a lifeboat for those going down from tuberculosis. Is it possible that professional jealousy or private quarrel or personal interest should stay such humanitarian work, which all are agreed is urgently needed?

If there are any doctors who have been practising in Kingston for some years back, opposing the building of a sanitarium on the hospital grounds on any plea of danger to others, they do so with scant grace. What of the unnumbered victims of pulmonary tuberculosis who were allowed to run their course and die, mixed indiscriminately with others not so afflicted in the general wards of the general hospital? It would seem to be intimated that any doctors who allowed these things to be would be indicting themselves for manslaughter in the objection to a separate building under special conditions and control, on the ground of its being a menace to the health of others in the neighborhood?

The lady should rely entirely on the statements of Dr. W. T. Connell and Dr. A. P. Knight, that there is no danger in the proximity of cases in a sanitarium where there is scientific supervision and that the danger is in leaving the cases to chance and uncontrolled. These men know whereof they speak and no one can accuse them of having an axe to grind. To an objective it seems something like this: A sanitarium is greatly needed. Funds are partly provided for a building. A sanitarium could be operated on the hospital grounds, because of co-operation in administration. A sanitarium could not be built, equipped and operated apart entirely from the general hospital. Really the general hospital, which is always in straits for money, would be much weakened by the interest and funds which would be deflected to a sanitarium if it could be built in a different locality. Surely a mass meeting were called and the frank, full statement of the case placed before it, the great majority would be in favor of the immediate erection of a sanitarium where alone it can be built, on the hospital grounds.

Who will be responsible while the building of this sanitarium "hangs up" for the death of those who will die of tuberculosis who might have lived and loved and been beloved? OBSERVER.
