REVENUE OF QUEEN'S MILITARY CHANGES

HAS TREBLED IN THE PAST TEN YEARS. HEADQUARTERS RE-ESTABLISHED AT KINGSTON.

The Revenue of the Arts and Theology Departments Has Doubled in That Time.

In 1903, when the Queen's university question was before the Presbyterian general assembly at Vancouver, B.C., the question was asked as to what additional revenue the arts and theology departments of the university required, and the answer was \$20,000 a year more. At that time, the revenue of arts and theology was \$53,997. This year it is \$106,800, or nearly double what it was eight years ago. The revenue and expenditure figures for arts and theology for the past eleven years are—

In 1899-1900 there were 418 students in arts and theology, of whom 118 were extra mural. In 1909-1910 the figures were 943 and 438.

In 1899-1900 the revenue in all departments, (arts, theology, medicine and school of mining) was \$74,930. The number of students was 660.

In 1909-1910 the revenue in all departments, (arts, theology, medicine school of mining and education) was \$210,200. The students totalled 1,517.

OPPOSITION RESOLUTION

Presented at the Meeting of Queen's University Trustees.

The following was the resolution presented at the meeting of Queen's University Board of Trustees by those opposing the separation of the university from the Presbyterian church: "Whereas the trustees, in asking the vote of the graduates on the constitutional changes, requested the senate and the members of the board to refrain from discussion of the matter whilst the vote was being taken; and whereas the deans of several faculties discharging this request issued to the graduates a circular letter advocating the constitutional changes proposed; and whereas in the voting paper issued to graduates no provision is made for the votes of those who desire the constitution to remain unchanged; it is resolved that the board are unable to accept the vote as a proper expression of the mind of the graduates on the subject."
