POINTERS FOR CITIZENS.

They Should Assist the Collectors of Garbage.

To make the present garbage system in Kingston, the success it should be, the collectors should receive the hearty support of all the citizens. A couple of cases came before the notice of the inspector, William McCammon, yesterday, which are worthy of note. The inspector was passing a certain house, and found one of the drivers coming away from a house without the garbage, and he informed the inspector that he could not get into the yard to get the garbage, because the gate was locked. The case was reported to the people living in the house, and they were told that they must leave the gate open for the collector. In another case reported, the gate was locked, and also the front door, and the good lady of this house reported to the authorities that the man had not called to collect the garbage.

The man had made his call, but when he found both the gate and the door locked, he was unable to get it. Here then, is the point. The collector must be given assistance. The garbage must be left in a convenient place for him in the yard, and if the people are away from the house, it will have to be left at the edge of the sidewalk, in a proper can. If the people go away and do not make the necessary arrangements, it is impossible for the man who does the collecting to do the work.

ALLEN PROPERTY FOR DUMPING GROUNDS.

The City Property Committee Needs the Land—City Hall Will be Redecorated During the Coming Summer.

The city requires a dumping ground and the property committee of the city council yesterday afternoon decided to ask that body for authority to expropriate the Allen property, a longside the quarry lots owned by the city, on Montreal street, near the House of Industry, and for which a price cannot be agreed upon. The property is of little value, and recommended by the city engineer as one of the best places for dumping purposes. The locality in which it is situated is most unsightly, and can be greatly improved by filling in, and continuing a street. In the meantime the committee will ask T. W. Nash for permission to dump on his lots close by.

This year the city hall interior is to be redecorated. This work should have been done long ago but the property committee never had money enough. This year Ald. Ross secured an appropriation for the purpose. Plans and specifications are to be prepared by the city engineer, Ald. Ross and Litton being appointed to consult with him as to what should be done. Ald. Hoag wanted more light installed. Another chandelier is required in front of the platform. It is possible that the lighting system may be changed, doing away with chandeliers and using small ceiling lights.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

WHAT WILL BE DONE WITH STEAMER SHARPLES?

One Report Says She May Not be Repaired—Decision Rests With Lloyd's Insurance Company—Marine Notes of Interest.

What will be done with the steamer Sharples? This is just now a burning question, in marine circles. It is understood that she will undergo some repairs here, as she has been taken to the Kingston dry dock to await entry. According to despatches sent out from Buffalo, there is just a chance of the vessel not being repaired.

It is stated that the vessel cannot be placed in dry dock until the London Lloyd orders such a step taken. It has been abandoned by the owners, to the underwriters.

It appears that Capt. Reid and Capt. Baker took the contract for raising the vessel for \$20,000 or a percentage of the salvage if they delivered the Sharples into port, and nothing if they failed. The vessel having been towed into port, is now the property of the London Lloyds.

A despatch from Buffalo, has the following in regard to the vessel: "It is intimated by one of the officials of the Buffalo Dry-dock Co. that the steamer is not worth repairing because the hull was almost pounded to pieces on the rocks during the winter."

The Sharples was owned by the Great Lakes & St. Lawrence Transportation Co. The boat is of Welland canal size and is not well suited to general lake transportation. She is 241 feet long and 41 feet beam. She was built in 1903. About 15 per cent of her insurance has been paid, including the five per cent carried by the Great Lakes Protective Association. The English underwriters, holding about 83 per cent of the risk, have not yet settled.

Rather Unlucky Opening.

The opening of navigation, so far as Kingston is concerned, has been rather unlucky, because of the fact that a number of vessels have met with mishaps in this vicinity. In looking up the records to-day, the Whig's marine man found that it was the 13th day of April when navigation was officially opened. The 13th is always regarded as being unlucky, and the superstitious will be sure to put this down for the cause of the many maritime mishaps which have occurred in this district.

Movements of Vessels.

There was a thin coat of ice over Anglin's Bay, this morning. The steamer Seguin is in the Kingston dry dock having some repairs made to her hull.

The steamer Port Colborne is on her way with a cargo of grain for Richardson's elevator.

The M. T. Co's tug Glyde, which was in Kingston dry dock, yesterday, cleared from there last evening.

The steamer Rideau King arrived at Swift's last night, from Ottawa, and cleared on her return trip this morning.

The steamers Britannic and Rockferry arrived at Richardson's elevator, from Chicago, with corn, both carrying about 60,000 bushels.

The steamer John Sharples is still awaiting the opportunity to get into the Kingston dry dock to have some repairs made to her stern, before proceeding to Ogdensburg.

The steamer La Monde owned by Captain George Hammond, will make its first trip to Clayton to-day. The steamer, which was known as the Stranger, last year, has been undergoing extensive repairs during the winter and now is in first class shape.

According to report, this morning, the steamer Glenmount, was still aground at Crossover Light, but the chances are that she will soon be released. The vessel had a hole punched in her side, which is being patched up, and a barge is also at the scene to lighten the vessel of its cargo.

The steamer Canadian loaded with grain, from Fort William, is due at the M. T. Co's elevator, to-night; the steamer Edmonton, grain-laden, from Fort William, is due to arrive, to-morrow. The tug Bartlett will arrive from the Welland canal with the barge Dunmore, coal-laden and oil barge, No. 6; the steamer Westmount will arrive from Port Colborne with three grain barges.
