CANON STARR GOES

TO TORONTO AS RECTOR OF GRACE CHURCH.

He Has Accepted a Splendid Offer—His Loss Will be Keenly Felt in Kingston.

Canon George L. Starr, M.A., has accepted the offer of the Bishop of Toronto of the rectorship of Grace church, Toronto, and he will be inducted early in June. How great the loss to the cathedral will be only the workers in the parish can understand, though his work has extended far beyond its limits. Many of the sick poor, who had no connection with the cathedral or the Anglican church, have been helped by his ministrations, and his efforts in all

branches of philanthropic work have been unending. He is beloved by the children of the city, and as a writer in this paper said some years ago, no cloud has ever arisen between him and the congregation in which he has faithfully ministered. He has been a true parish priest to his own flock and a friend to everyone high and low. At a meeting of the men of the congregation, held on Wednesday evening, after the news had been circulated that, possibly, Canon Starr might accept the Toronto parish, the following resolution was passed, on motion of R. J. Carson, treasurer of the diocese, and M. S. Sutherland: "That we, the members of St. George's cathedral place on record our hope that the Rev. Canon Starr will not sever his connection with the cathedral in which he has done loyal and faithful service, as he is beloved, not only by the congregation but by the citizens of Kingston." Canon Starr is a native of Brookville. He graduated at Trinity College, Toronto, as master of arts, and was soon afterwards appointed to St.

ATHLETIC CONTEST OF Y.M.C.A. BUSINESS BOYS. NO CHANGE IN THE LABOR SITUATION.

Held at Queen's Athletic Grounds—A Canoe Club to be Formed—City Baseball League Pitchers.

Buck's team missed out for second place. R. Langdon stood highest in points, having to his credit thirteen. A. Buck and H. Kennedy stand second with eleven each, while E. Williams and E. Barry came next with eight. The rest of the point-getters were Suddard five, Bain and Edgar four each, Hamilton and Barnes three each, Majan and Mollin two each.

LIBERALS WILL ACCEPT.

The Proposal to Adjourn for Two Months.

There was considerable opposition from the "stand-patter" section of the party who thought it was up to the government to keep faith with the United States by fighting the reciprocity bill through without adjournment, and allowing the premier and certain members of both parties to pair off and go to the coronation.

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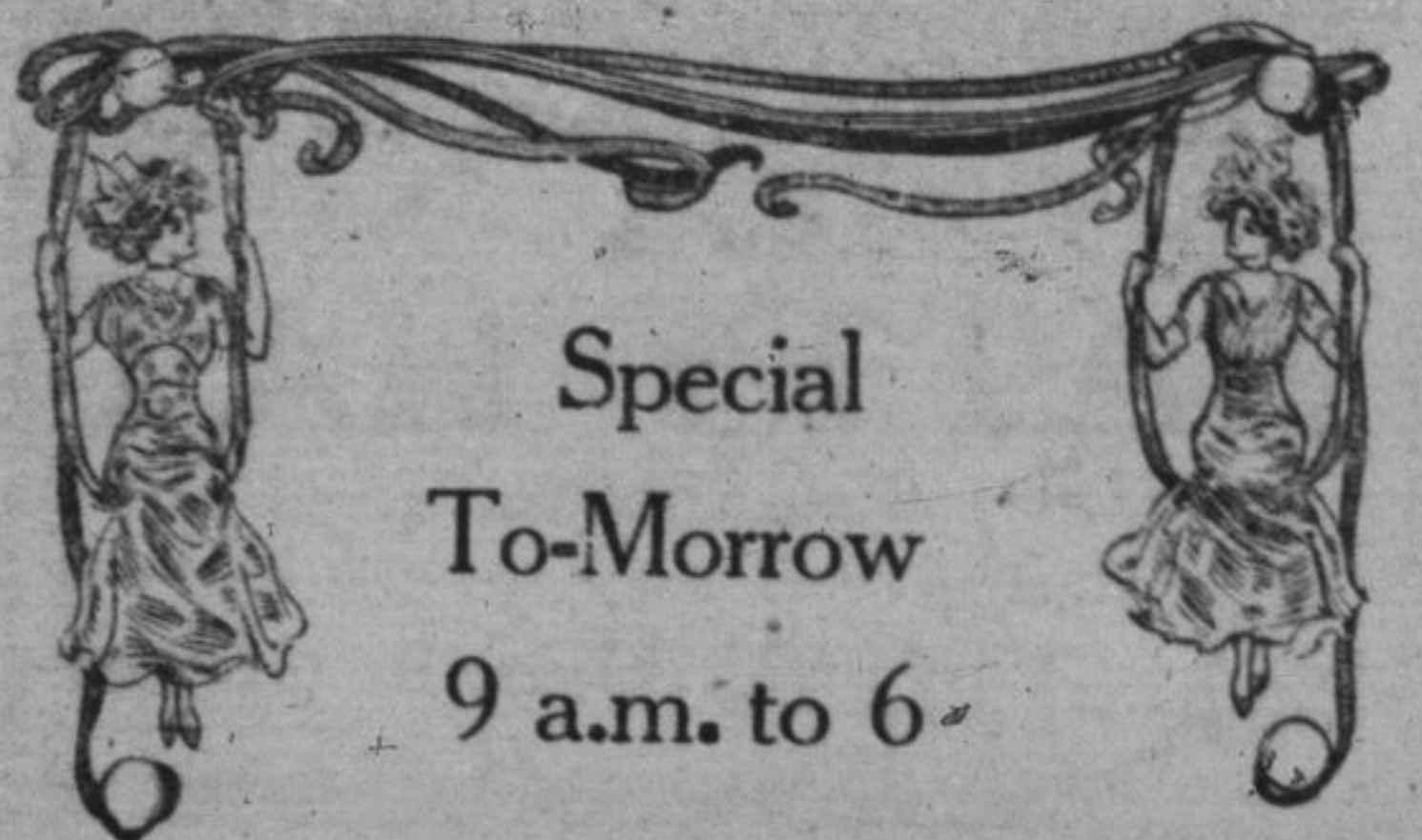
