**TO BUY NEW TRUCK**

FOR THE HOOK AND LADDER WAGON

Of the Fire Department—The Contract Was Awarded to James Laturney for \$1,375.

It was a very short session that the fire and light committee had Friday afternoon. About the only thing that was before the committee was the considering of tenders for the construction of a hook and ladder truck. There was only one tender, that of James Laturney. His tender was for \$1,375. On the recommendation of Fire Chief Armstrong, it was accepted. There was also a tender for a new boiler for the Chatham engine, but Fire Chief Armstrong said it was not necessary to have that at once; it was thought advisable to lay this tender over for a time until more money is forthcoming. A tender for \$325 for a new sleigh truck was received from James Laturney, but as this apparatus would not be needed until the winter, this matter was also laid over. A number of accounts were brought up and ordered to be paid. Those in attendance were: Aids, Givens (chairman), Hoag, Fair and Hanley.

**Nominations to Fill Vacancy in Town Council.**  
 Ganoque, May 6.—Mayor Rogers has issued, through Town Clerk McAmmon, a notice of a public meeting of the citizens at the town hall on Friday next, to receive nominations for the vacancy at the council board occasioned by the recent resignation of Councillor McParland. The filling of the vacancy on the board of water works commissioners is by the statute in the hands of the mayor, who has the privilege of appointing a successor to fill a vacancy in that board.

The financial statement of Grace Methodist church for the quarter ending April 30th shows a very satisfactory condition of affairs financially. There is a cash balance of \$229.14. The first of the big steel freighters of the Inland Lake line, was in port Thursday evening and loaded a big consignment of shovels from the D. F. Jones Co. for the far west trade; also a large consignment of rivets and other goods from the Harmer & Bullock Co. They will all here regularly through this season at Britton's wharf, where a large warehouse has been erected, sufficiently large for all local needs.

The steamer Britannia, on her way up from Cornwall, where she wintered, made her first call of the season last evening. The schooner Granger, of Kingston, is in port with a cargo of damaged western corn from the cargo of the Sharples. The corn is being used for feed of the farmers in this vicinity. The coal schooner Theodore Voges arrived yesterday with a cargo.
