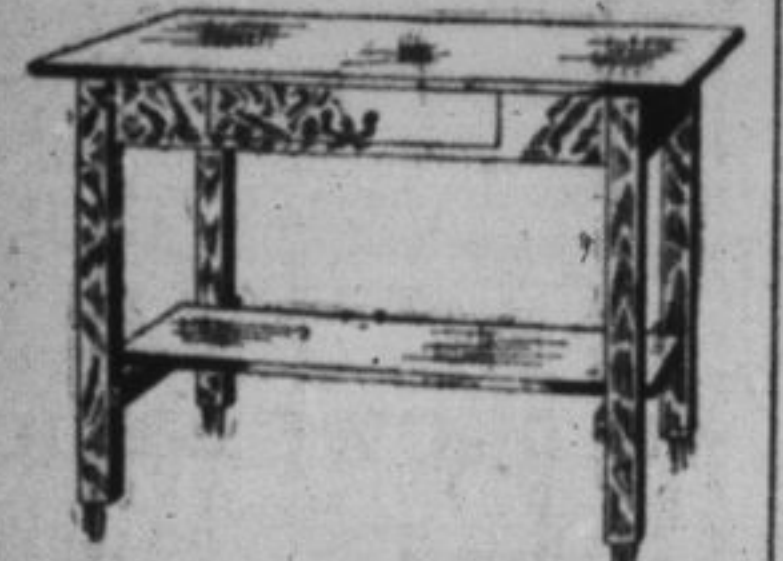

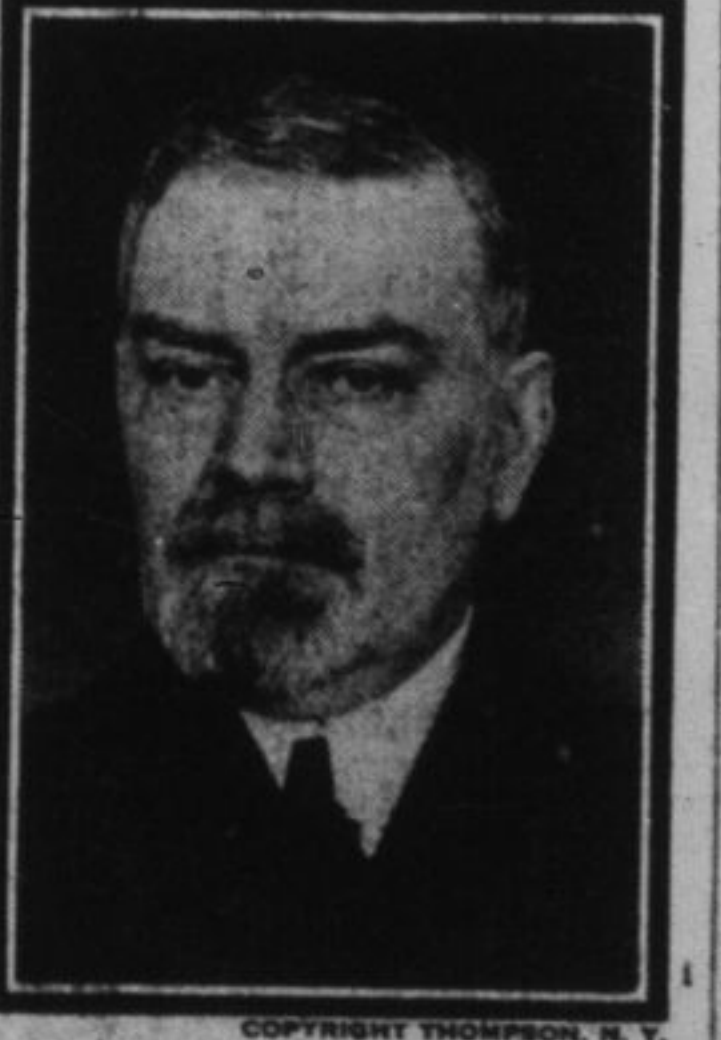

**FOUND DEAD IN BED**

Autopsy on Body of Mrs. GEORGE PALMER.

Death Resulted From Natural Causes—Driver of a Delivery Waggon Made the Discovery.

To leave one's wife at home in the morning apparently as well as could be and to come home in the evening and find her dead would be a shock for any husband. That was the experience of George Palmer, who is employed at R. J. Lawler's liquor store, and who resides on King street west. Mr. Palmer left his home on Saturday morning at 5:30 o'clock to go to his work, and left his wife at home apparently as well as she ever was. Saturday being a busy day he did not go home for his dinner, but took it down town. When James Holland, driver for R. J. Lawler, went to the home about seven o'clock in the evening with some meat he called to Mrs. Palmer that he had left the meat. She did not answer and he called the second and third time with no response. He entered the room and saw Mrs. Palmer lying in the bed. He went to arouse her and found that she was dead. He immediately notified her husband and telephoned the hospital. The hospital notified Coroner Mundell, as there were evidences of struggling, and the body was distorted. The remains were removed to the undertaking parlors of S. S. Corbett on Saturday evening. Coroner Mundell decided that a post-mortem examination was necessary, so Dr. Keyes performed an autopsy on the remains but it was found that death had resulted from natural causes.

Deceased was forty-nine years of age, a Roman Catholic in religion, and besides her husband, leaves an adopted daughter. The funeral took place Monday afternoon to St. Mary's cathedral.

President Taft. "I am quite aware that from one motive or another a great deal of effort and money has been spent in sending circulars to farmers to convince them that this Canadian treaty, if adopted, will do them injury. I do not know that it is possible to allay such fears by argument, pending the consideration of the treaty by the senate. But there is one way—and that a conclusive way—of demonstrating the fallacious and unfounded character of all such fears, and that is to try it. There is no obligation on either nation to continue the reciprocity arrangement any longer than it desires, and if it is found by actual practice that there is a permanent injury to the farmers everybody knows that they can sufficiently control legislation to bring about a return to the old conditions. Those of us who are responsible for the Canadian treaty are willing and anxious to subject it to that kind of a test."
