

MONEY GRANT

Of \$50,000 For Kingston Harbor

IS IN ESTIMATES

JUST BROUGHT DOWN IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

George Taylor Asking Questions in Regard to Mixed Marriage Law—No Actual Dates Fixed for the Adjournment of Parliament.

Ottawa, May 9.—The supplementary estimates tabled in the house yesterday included several Kingston items. The total aggregate \$17,000,000, and the main estimates \$176,000,000.

In the house George Taylor, Gairinger, asked a number of questions respecting mixed marriages. He wanted to know if the dominion government has power to legalize or validate any or every marriage solemnized anywhere in Canada.

Undoubtedly the feeling in favor of an early appeal to the people is growing among the liberals. Their calculation is that the census figures by constituencies can be secured by September 1st at latest.

Over-crowded, the solution of the situation depends very much upon the developments at Washington and in London. If the United States senate should decline to put the agreement through within a reasonable time, it is quite probable that the reciprocity proposals might be given a back seat in the autumn session.

Meanwhile, the House of Commons will put in the best part of this week in an endeavor to clear the order paper as much as possible.

INSPECTION MADE

OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

For the First Time in Ten Years—Most of the Signatures Have Faded Out.

Washington, May 9.—The most precious document in the United States, namely, the Declaration of Independence, was hauled from a seclusion of almost ten years, Saturday, and inspected to ascertain if it is fading away and becoming indecipherable.

The inspection took place in the library of the state department, where it rests in a safe, framed under glass, but neither fireproof nor waterproof.

The incident gave rise to some facetious comment among the onlookers. For example: How much of the Declaration, such as the reference to all men being born free and equal, would now be passed without amendment, in view of the inequalities of wealth that have grown up in the country?

FIVE THOUSAND CANNIBALS SURROUNDED CRAFT.

A Series of Thrilling Adventures on a Coral Reef in German East Africa—Got Clear of the Reef When the Tide Came at the Fall.

New York, May 9.—After fighting off 100 war canoes full of cannibals while aground on a coral reef at the Womazi Islands, German East Africa, the British steamship Kasenga arrived here today.

Five days out from New York a heavy gale smothered the mule pens and all the mules ran loose around the heaving decks, a number being swept overboard.

Half an hour before high tide 100 war canoes filled with naked cannibals paddled swiftly toward the Kasenga. Each canoe held fifty men. On these islands the crew and passengers of a French mail boat were clubbed to death ten years ago.

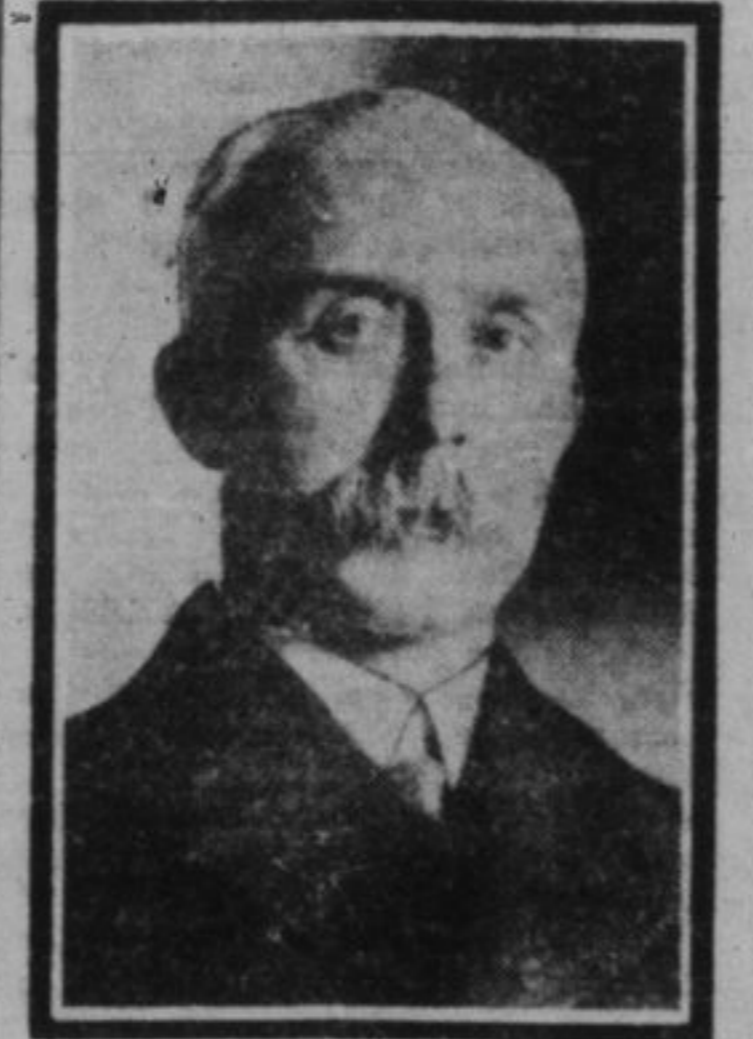
