Had to be Amputated—Switzerland Girl Operated on in Kingston Hospital for Appendicitis.

Napawese, May 11.—Mrs. John Harrington met with a serious accident this week. She was drawing a pump of water with a windlass pump. Her finger caught in the chain which crushed it so badly that it had to be amputated. Miss Hazel Miller, granddaughter of James H. Miller, of Switzerland, was taken to Kingston last week for an operation for appendicitis. The operation was performed and the patient is slowly improving, although at first great fears were expressed for her recovery.

The meeting of the executive of the City Baseball League, last evening, was for the purpose of considering a communication from the Y.L.C.B.A. baseball club, to the effect that they wished to withdraw their senior team from the city league. The senior members of the Y.M.C.A. had their first weekly handicap athletic meet on Queen's athletic field last evening. The three events pulled off were highly contested. In the seventy-five yard dash, Joseph Adams crossed the tape first. P. Beckwith and G. Fleming ran a tie for second. F. Kiell came third. J. Adams was again victorious in the broad jump, covering a distance of fifteen feet nine inches. G. Fleming stood second, and H. Hawley third. From the ten yard mark, P. Beckwith covered the 225 yard dash, with H. Adams who had ten yards, second and G. Fleming from scratch third.

Games For Victoria Day

There will be three baseball games on May 24th, the day on which the celebration is to be held. The games in the morning will be a junior one, but the teams have not been decided yet. There will be two senior games in the afternoon, for which a purse of \$100 has been offered.
