HON. MR. BECK HERE

TO ADDRESS PUBLIC MEETING ON POWER QUESTION.

He Will Make Kingston a Better Offer Than He Quoted at Brockville a Month Ago—Mayor Graham to Preside at Meeting in City Hall.

Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro-Electric Commission, arrived here this afternoon for the purpose of addressing a public meeting in the city hall this evening on the question of cheap power for Kingston, and submitting another offer to the city. He is the guest of W. F. Nickle, M. P.

It is just a month ago since Mr. Beck met the representatives of eastern Ontario municipalities at Brockville and submitted the offer of the commission for power. The offer to Kingston, although it has not yet been considered by the committee on light, heat and power, which referred it to a sub-committee, was considered

ed not as good as that of the Seymour company. The latter has since made another offer to the city on the basis of that made by the commission. The latter now intimates that it closed a contract with the Washington Power company for 60,000 horse power, and that it is able to make Kingston a better quotation. Mr. Beck has not yet stated what this offer is, although asked by Ald. Elliott, chairman of the city committee on power. He said he would make it at the public meeting, so there will no doubt be a large audience in the city hall this evening to hear Mr. Beck and what he has to offer this city. Mayor Graham will preside.

Rally of Kingston Old Boys. Chicago Canadian-American. The Kingston Old Boys' Association held a splendid meeting in the Auditorium hotel last week, about 150 being present. Patrick Nacey was elected honorary president. Mr. Nacey has been fifty years in Chicago. He is proprietor of "The Kingston" apartment building at Indiana avenue and Forty-fifth street, called after his home town. The matter of the excursion to the reunion at Kingston in July was discussed. If rates can be secured the Chicagoans will attend. A fine programme of music and some capital speech-making added to the evening's pleasure.

Mothers' Day Sunday. Sunday next will be observed the world over, as Mothers' Day, and the wearing of a white rose will be the order of the day. Mothers' Day Movement was started by Anna Jarvis, in Philadelphia, in 1908. It has spread through the entire country, and for the first time in Canada was celebrated last May. It was observed by many Kingstonians last year. In Ottawa, Mayor Hopewell has issued a proclamation, asking citizens generally, to observe Sunday as Mothers' Day.

Calgary, Alta., April 28, 1911. Rev. Principal Dyde, Strathcona, Alta.

Dear Principal Dyde: We, the undersigned members of Knox church, Calgary, undertake to be responsible for the salary of a professor for the Presbyterian Theological College, at Strathcona, commencing at \$2,500, and rising \$100 yearly, until it reaches \$3,000, the obligation to take effect July 1st, 1911.
