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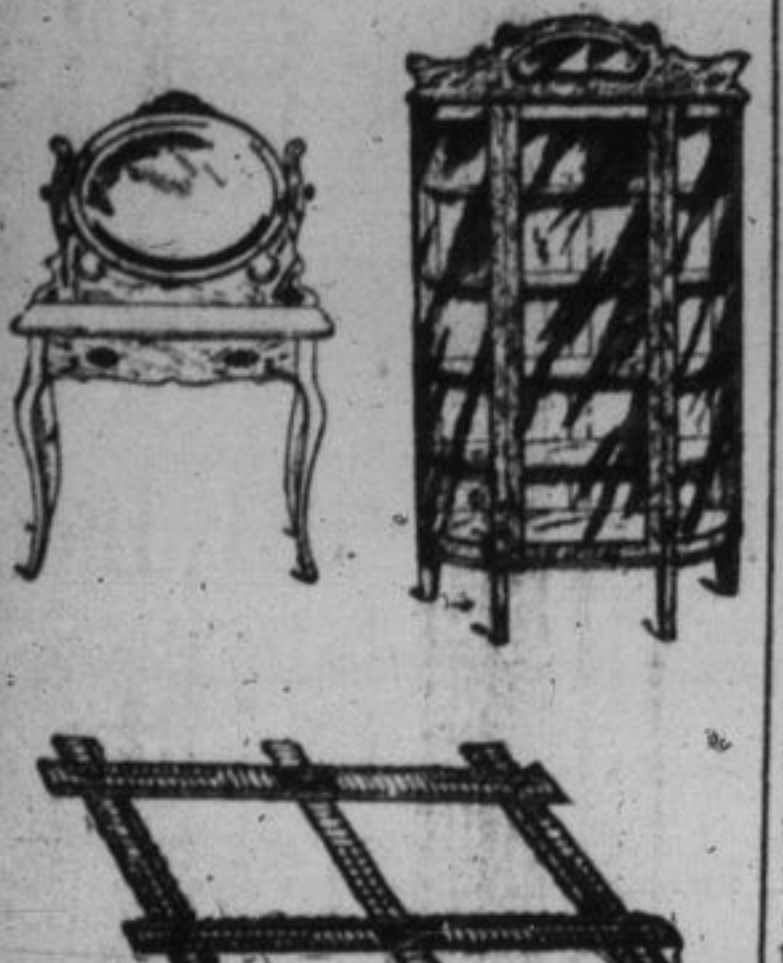

EATON'S BASEBALL TEAM SENDS CHALLENGE.

It will be considered by City League This Evening—Y.M.C.A. Athletics for Victoria Day—Other Notes of Sport.

A letter was received by the Wing, this morning, from J. Caine, manager of Eaton's baseball team, Toronto, requesting a game with a local senior team for some date which would be convenient for both teams. The competition was handed over to Bernard G. Tierney, president of the City Baseball League, and it will be dealt with at their meeting this evening. It will be impossible to arrange this game for Victoria day celebration, as the games have already been arranged but it is likely that the game may be arranged for some other holiday during the summer. Such a game would undoubtedly be a great drawing card here, for if the baseball team is as strong as the hockey team which represents the great "mail order house" a rattling good game should be the result.

Athletics for Celebration.

On May 24th the athletes of the city will have an opportunity to display the amount of training they have been doing this spring. In connection with the celebration which the committee has planned there will be run three athletic events, all for city championships. These championships will be held annually. The events will be 100 yards dash, while suitable cups and medals will be awarded. Entries may be made with the secretary, R. Bowron, Y.M.C.A., Kingston. The events are open to any registered amateur in the world.

Will Decide Teams For 24th.

The executive of the City Baseball League will meet this evening for the purpose of arranging the final things for the game on Saturday, when the baseball season will be opened. After the executive of the league will meet a representative of the sports committee of the Victoria day celebration and decide which teams will play on that day. The old way of deciding which teams shall play will be resorted to, that of placing the names of three teams of the senior league in the hat and the first two which were drawn will be the ones to play in the morning. The winner of the morning game will play with the third team in the afternoon.

Notwithstanding the fact that there are new players on both teams there is considerable moxie up on both teams and the game will undoubtedly be witnessed by a record-breaking crowd. Albert Street Resident Criticizes Board of Works.

Dodds, Fair, Goshin, Etherington and Campbell.

I ask why are not Lower Albert street and Upper Albert street watered as well, if we are compelled to pay between Earl and Union streets to be paved? It is not long ago they went to the states and saw several pavements, but there never was one block in any city that could satisfy the board of trade.—JUSTICE.

Enquiry at the city engineer's office reveals the fact that city Assessor Gordon reported the petition of the Albert street residents as insufficiently signed. It seems that the law provides that the petitioners must reside on the street concerning which their petition. Owners of property on Albert street who reside elsewhere cannot sign a street watering petition. This is rather strange, because the street watering rate is chargeable to the property owner if the tenant fails to pay.

CRIMEAN VETERAN DEAD.

Angus Shaw, Lansdowne, Succumbed to Blood Poisoning.

Word was received in the city Wednesday morning of the death in Brookville of the late Angus Shaw, of Lansdowne, uncle of Mrs. J. M. Sherman and Mrs. J. Davis, of this city, and father of Dr. J. Shaw, Lansdowne. Blood-poisoning was the cause of death.

The late Mr. Shaw was a Scotchman, who had won the hearts of all by his kindness and goodwill. He was a veteran of the Crimean war and bore the scars of that fearful struggle. For many years he resided in Kingston and later Mallorytown, where he was employed by the Grand Trunk railway. He was known all along the line by everyone.

He was a very enthusiastic horticulturist and his gardens at Wallington and on Benson's Island above Rockport, where he had resided lately, attracted great attention. Those who visited the Canadian side above Rockport, will perhaps recall Benson's summer home and his garden at Wallington, and beautifully decorated. These flowers were reared and tended with great care by the deceased. He was a member of the Masonic Order.
