SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 17 years of age who has been a resident of the Dominion for one year immediately preceding the date of application may apply to the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father and mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
 Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to take homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.
 A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-empted in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivating 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
