

MAY BE IMPOSSIBLE

TO ABOLISH THE METER RATES FOR LIGHT.

The Gas Plant Requires Many Renewals, Which Must be Paid for Out of Revenue—Additional Street Arc Lamps.

Owing to the fact that half the members are out of the city the light, heat and power committee did not have a meeting on Tuesday afternoon. Alds. Elliott (chairman), Hartley and Hanley were in attendance, but as the business before the meeting was of importance nothing was done.

There is the abolition of the gas and electrical meters to be considered. Mayor Graham wants the committee to report upon the advisability of abolishing these rates, and the question will have to be held over for another two weeks. Manager Folger had his report as to the meter receipts ready. These receipts total \$5,000. It is understood that the manager will not recommend the striking off of the rates. It is well known that the committee this year is going to put aside \$6,000 as the nucleus of a rest fund. It is also known that Manager Folger has reported to the committee that the gas generators must be renewed, and this will cost at least \$12,000. New flares must also be purchased if the gas plant is to give satisfaction, and another \$2,000 will be required for these. Repairs to the street mains are also needed, and possibly this will cost \$6,000. All these things are renewals of the plant, and must be paid out of revenue. Debentures cannot be issued to cover the cost. Until the plan is put into good condition it is doubtful if the committee will feel like recommending that the profits be decreased by \$5,000 a year, for a while at least.

It will be three or four weeks before the new street lighting apparatus arrives. Manager Folger and City Engineer Craig have yet to decide upon the number of additional lights required for the streets. Some dark night next week they intend to make a tour of the city and choose the places that should be lit. At present there are 155 arc lamps doing duty, and this number will likely be increased by forty-five.

PARADE TUESDAY NIGHT.

14th Regiment, P.W.O.R., Out on the March.

The usual weekly parade of the 13th regiment, P.W.O.R. was held on Tuesday night, to the cricket field, and was witnessed by several hundred citizens. Kingston's "soldier boys" always attract a big crowd, when they are out on the march, and as they passed out Bagot street on the way to the cricket field, there were many proud fathers, mothers, sisters, sweethearts and "kiddies." The boys presented a fine appearance. Arriving at the cricket field, about an hour and a half was spent in drill, when the return was made to the armouries.

Quite a large number of the boy scouts also paraded with the regiment, including the first troop, from the Y.M.C.A. and the third troop from Sydenham street church. The lads had a smart appearance, and many complimentary remarks were heard concerning them, as they passed along the street.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Men Arriving to Take Charge of Vessels.

The steamer John Randall cleared for Oswego on Tuesday afternoon.

The schooner Ford River discharged a cargo of coal at the M. T. Co.'s wharf, and is now at Richardson's wharf loading feldspar.

The steamer Sowards arrived from Oswego, coal-laden, with the schooner Maize in tow. The Sowards is discharging at Short's, Portsmouth, and the Maize at Crawford's wharf.

The steamer Wolfe Islander will undergo repairs at the Davis dry dock. She will be docked to-day. The vessel will be widened and false sides will be placed on her.

The steamer Island Wanderer will arrive in the city late on Saturday afternoon with an excursion from Clayton, N.Y. The excursionists will return home the same evening.

The steamers North King and Caspian will commence their regular trips from Port Hope and Cobourg to Charlotte, N.Y., on May 29th. Both boats have been thoroughly overhauled.
