USED BEER ON FIRE

HOW A CONNECTICUT TOWN WAS SAVED

Under a Woman's Leadership—The Men Kicked, But They Finally Yielded Up Their Beer.

Bolton, Conn., May 17.—Urged on by Mrs. W. C. Tucker, a prominent resident of this place, who appointed herself chief of the hastily organized fire department, sixty-three men reluctantly poured oceans of perfectly good beer on a fire which threatened to destroy the town.

While the women of the town are rejoicing over the fact that there was enough malt liquor to subdue the blaze and praising Mrs. Tucker's performance, the men are having no difficulty in restraining themselves from cheating. Homeless and beerless, they fought whether it would not have been better to let the town burn and save the "suds."

Forest fires which have been raging most of the week were communicated to three houses and half a dozen other buildings on the outskirts of the town. Mrs. Tucker, in her automobile, saw the danger and broke all speed laws gathering sixty-three volunteer fire fighters.

Just as the flames began to flirt with the New England hotel, the only hotel in the town, the firemen yelled: "The water is all gone, Mrs. Tucker!" "Don't worry about that," said the chief. "There's plenty of beer in the cellar. Get busy now, men and we'll flood the fire with sweet ambrosia."

The sixty-three men balked at one man. Scores paled at the thought of putting beer to such a base purpose. Many wept and one or two declared they would allow the town to burn before they would make such a sacrifice. They said they would be willing to squirt the beer on the fire between their teeth, but Mrs. Tucker insisted it would have to be dumped on by the barrel.

"Think of your wives and children," she reminded them. They rushed where the beer was thickest. In the rush three or four became wedged in the doorway. Crunching sounds indicated that the barrels were having their skulls fractured, and the strains of "Always Fair Weather" which floated from within indicated that the firemen were bidding the liquid a fond farewell.

"I fear some of them have been overcome," said a nervous woman spectator. She was right. Half a dozen of the brave souls had succumbed to the deadly back-and-front draughts; but enough of the force was intact to man the barrels, and presently the brown brew was flooding the premises.

There were several mishaps. One man was in the act of transferring a schooner to his interior when a woman told him the beer was needed to put out the fire. He told her that it was just about to quench a fire of his own. Another man was found in front of the hotel with his clothes blazing. His mouth was wide open, and investigation disclosed that he had set himself on fire. The beer was unassisted.

CHICAGO SOCIETY CUT.

Mrs. Harold McCormick Sets "Eligible" Limit.

Chicago, May 17.—Chicago society is puzzled over the invitation list of Mrs. Harold McCormick. She has taken a leading part in social and charitable affairs for some time and introduced innovations. One is the society promenades in Lincoln park. Now she is to give dances in the new refectory in the park.

This is a public institution and here and there an element of the public is kicking because the move limits the service to the public. Mrs. McCormick, who was Edith Rockefeller, ordained that Tuesday and Friday should be promenade days. According to persons who ought to know she has cut "eligibles" to 100.

The ostensible purpose of the "One Hundred Club" is to give the dances. The first dance will be given June 2nd, and great secrecy is being maintained in regard to it. But there is this assurance for those who will be hidden: Their names will have passed muster and they will be enrolled on a new list of "one hundred" that henceforth will represent the exclusive in Chicago society.

IT SIMPLY FLIES.

Thousand Island Craft Develops This as Maximum.

Washington, May 17.—In trials on the Potomac river here it is claimed that a new gasoline speed boat recently launched at Alexandria, Va., and owned by W. F. Harris, of the Thousand Islands, attained a maximum of forty-two miles an hour. This speed record was unofficial, but was faster by seven miles than any water-craft ever before had made.

The new boat is twenty-six feet long and has twin engines of six cylinders, each giving a horse power of 250. The craft has not yet been named. It was built to defend the Harnsworth International Motor Boat trophy in the coming races at Huntington, L. I., and to challenge for the gold cup during the Thousand Islands racing season.

San Francisco, Cal., May 17.—A Honolulu cable says: A leper was released here to-day, being officially pronounced as cured, after having undergone fourteen months of treatment, which consisted of freezing the affected portions with carbon dioxide. Other patients are showing a marked improvement.
