**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE  
head of a family, or any male over 18  
years old may homestead a quarter  
section of available Dominion land in  
Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at  
the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-  
Agency for the district he proposes  
to homestead, or at an agency on certain  
conditions, by father, mother, son,  
daughter, brother or sister of intending  
homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon  
and cultivation of the land in each of  
three years. A homesteader may live  
with his wife and children upon a farm of  
at least 40 acres solely owned and  
occupied by him or by his father,  
mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In case of death, the homesteader in  
good standing may pre-empt a quarter  
section alongside his homestead. Price,  
\$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months' resi-  
dence upon a farm of 40 acres and  
cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted  
his homestead right and cannot obtain  
a new homestead may apply for a pur-  
chased homestead in certain districts.

Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must  
reside six months in each of three  
years upon fifty acres and erect  
a house worth \$100.00.

**ORPHANS' HOME WING**

Song and Dramatic Recital

Viewed the New Wing—Every-  
thing in it is Modern and San-  
itary.

The wing of the Orphans' Home,  
which was completed recently, was  
thrown open for the benefit of the public,  
Wednesday afternoon, from  
three o'clock until six o'clock. The  
day was very warm and beautiful, con-  
sequently there was a large number of  
people from all parts of the city to  
view the new addition. The building  
was declared formally opened at 3:30  
o'clock, by Mayor Graham, who ex-  
pressed surprise and pleasure to see  
that such a building as this one  
should have been erected. Everything  
was clean, modern and up-to-date.

Thomas Sinclair and those who  
were connected with the staff of the  
Orphans' Home, as well as a large num-  
ber which were interested, conduct-  
ed the parties through the building.  
The old part has been entirely gone  
over and brightened up with paint and  
kalsomine and looks almost as good  
as new. One feature of the new wing  
is the ventilators which have been in-  
stalled in every room. They are so  
arranged that the air, when it enters  
the room, does not strike those who  
are in it, but floats upward and be-  
comes warmed before the children  
breathe it. Other ventilators take off  
the foul air and are situated near the  
ceiling.

Another very up-to-date feature  
which was much admired were the  
bathrooms and washrooms. Every-  
thing in these rooms is sanitary. The  
towel racks are of glass, the walls and  
floor are of tile, and everything is just  
as clean as brains and skill can make  
them. The rooms throughout the  
whole building are finished some in blue  
and white and others in green and white.

The play room for the children is  
one thing that met with the hearty  
approval of all those who saw it. Every-  
thing in it is so handy and com-  
fortable for the children that they  
may enjoy themselves.

The boiler which furnishes heat for  
the building is another of the modern  
things which is to be found there. Every-  
thing around it is perfectly safe and  
a child can run over it. The laundry  
room, kitchen and various other rooms  
were the source of much comment on  
the part of those who visited them, and everyone was satisfied with the way things had been  
done.
