**LIVE STOCK MARKETS.**  
The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

**Montreal, May 15.**—About 1,100 head of butchers' cattle, 425 calves, 50 sheep and lambs and 1,000 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The offerings of livestock at this market during the week were 3,000 cattle, 19 calves, 300 sheep and lambs and 2,275 hogs.

Trade was rather dull, and the price had a downward tendency all round. Prime beefs sold at from 5 1/2c to 6c per lb. Pretty good animals, 4 1/2c to 5c. 'Spots' (some) 4 1/2c to 5c per lb. with good bulls at from 4 1/2c to 5c per lb.

Cattle sold at from 3c to 6c per lb. Sheep sold at about 5c per lb. Yearling lambs at 6c to 6 1/2c do., and the spring lambs at \$4 to \$7 each.

Good lots of hogs at 6 1/2c to 6 3/4c per lb. Heavy hogs are difficult to sell at any reasonable price.

**TRACES OF CYRENE FOUND.**  
Richard Norton Talks of Archaeological Expedition.

Rome, May 18.—Richard Norton, head of the American archaeological expedition to Cyrenaica, returned here yesterday, on board of Allison Arnold's yacht, and proceeded to London, where he will spend the summer. Mr. Norton says that Deane, the member of the party who was killed some months ago, was murdered by two tribesmen who had no relations with the workmen of the expedition. The tragedy was due to hostility to the expedition, and Mr. Norton says that he has ample proof that the murderers intended to kill him, killing Deane by mistake. The case is in the hands of the local authorities, and United States Consul Wood has gone to Beni to co-operate with the authorities there. The expedition was most successful. Traces of the city of Cyrene, built B.C. 651, were found together with important fragments of sculptures and pottery. The work is to be resumed.

**AMAZES PHYSICIANS.**  
Although Body Lifeless and Mortifying, Girl Conscious.

New York, May 18.—Physicians are mystified by the case of Ella Campbell, sixteen months old, who is a patient in the Florence Crittenton Home, in Paterson, N.J. The child is suffering from an ailment resembling tuberculosis, but the attending physician says no one has been able to really diagnose the illness. Last Wednesday mortification set in, and the child's body is now in the condition of one dead several days. It has been necessary to isolate her.

Although her body is lifeless and immovable, the child is conscious and recognizes those about her.

**Governor of Jerusalem.**  
Constantinople, May 18.—The governor of Jerusalem has been recalled on account of the trouble which has arisen over the operations of an English expedition accused of having excavated beneath the mosque of Omar. This expedition was under the leadership of Capt. Montague Parker, a brother of the Earl of Morley, and after it had become known that the mosque had been profaned and relics removed by the archaeologists, the governor was roused in the streets by having permitted foreigners to carry on their work.

**Admit Doping Rounds.**  
Syracuse, N.Y., May 18.—Emma Chase and Elizabeth Quick were held for the grand jury on a charge of murder, first degree, when arraigned in police court for causing the death of John Rourke, an aged North Rose farmer. Rourke was doped with morphine in a saloon by the women and they admitted to the police they put the drug in Rourke's drink for the purpose of robbing him.

**Hard Battle With Tribesmen.**  
Rel. Aion, Morocco, May 18.—The section of the French relief column under Lieutenant-Col. Bayouvez engaged the rebels at Metela on Sunday. The rebellious tribesmen lost 100 killed and 200 men wounded. The French drove off the enemy at the point of the bayonet.
