ONLY ONE OPPOSED

METHODIST DISTRICT FAVORS CHURCH UNION.

The Discussion Was Warm at Times—Rev. J. T. Pitcher Thought Presbyterians Should Love Methodists More.

The ministers and laymen of the Methodist district, who finished their business and closed their session for another year, declared themselves as being in favor of church union. The vote was almost unanimous, only one vote being registered against it. The discussion came up at the Thursday afternoon session in Princess street Methodist church, and at times grew very warm, sometimes three members being on the floor at one time clamoring for a hearing. It was brought out in the discussion that it was not to be expected that every Methodist and Presbyterian should be in favor of this move on the part of the churches. Some of the staunchest and truest of both religions have declared themselves against the union for the very reason that they are so loyal to their own church and think no other is as good.

Rev. J. T. Pitcher, chairman of the district, presided, and in one stage of the discussion he took the floor after requesting one of the members present to take the chair. He said he was sorry that some of the Presbyterians did not love the Methodists more than they did. The Presbyterians wanted practically the same thing as the Methodists did, so why should they not be together. Another point which he brought out was that he thought the stationing of ministers was not what it should be. In some instances, he thought it would benefit the community greatly if the ministers were to remain longer than four years. The talk of itinerancy was worked to death. He thought the changes in many instances were against Methodism. He thought the settlement committee should have power to remove a minister if he was not suited to the community, or if he thought the community wished for a change that all they would have to do would be to notify the community. There was a very spirited discussion upon this matter. Some thought that this would be very humiliating to the minister, for if he was not invited to stay longer it would mean that he would have to change. Nothing further was done in this regard, but the discussion was suddenly brought to a close and other business transacted.

ROBBED A SICK MAN

CLARENCE WALKER RELIEVED OF WATCH AND MONEY.

Was Picked Up Unconscious, and Theft Was Discovered After He Recovered at the Hospital—The Police Have Been Asked to Investigate the Case.

One of the meanest thefts on record is that which took place in connection with the case of Clarence Walker, the young Oswego man, who was picked up in an almost dying condition and taken to the Hotel Dieu, the case being referred to in the Whig on Thursday night. When the young fellow came to his senses, at the hospital, he asked about his belongings, and then it was found that he had been relieved of his gold watch and pin, and the sum of \$8. Where did the money go to? This is the question, and the police were to-day asked to investigate the case. Walker had been around the city with companions drinking, but it is believed that he was robbed while he was on the roadway in an unconscious state. The young fellow is sure that he had the money, watch and pin earlier in the day, and it looks like a straight case of theft. Walker is still at the Hotel Dieu, and is getting along nicely. He will likely be able to be around again in the course of a few days. That Walker is alive to-day is due to the fact that he was found in the nick of time, and given prompt attention.

At the Police Court. At the police court, on Friday, there were five cases in which citizens were charged with neglecting to comply with the sanitary by-law, in making the necessary improvements on their property. One case was dropped, another adjourned for a week, to allow for an inspection by the city engineer, and a third was also adjourned for a week to give time for the work being done, and in the other two the necessary work is to be carried out as soon as possible.
