A THREE YEAR DOSE

GIVEN TO MAN IN HAMILTON
FOR HOUSE BREAKING.

How a Port Hope Man, Looking for
 the Insane Asylum, Found His
 Way Into Kingston Penitentiary.
 Hamilton, Ont., May 19.—William
 Henry Ryan, Port Hope, appeared in
 police court yesterday morning on
 two charges of housebreaking, and
 one of attempting to break into a
 house. He pleaded not guilty to the
 three charges and elected to be tried
 by the magistrate. The first charge
 was that of attempting to break
 into the residence of Mrs. Frank Wan-
 zler, Foreman Place, Miss Sims, a
 domestic at Mrs. Wanzler's, said last
 Thursday, while working upstairs, she
 heard a noise at the back of the
 house and, looking outside, she saw
 a man taking a screen off the
 cellar window. She called to him
 and he asked her the way to the asy-
 lum.
 She told him, and he left and went
 up the steps towards the top of the
 mountain. She then notified the po-
 lice and Constable Xasley went up to
 the house and secured a description
 of the man.
 James McIlraith and John Wall,
 employed at the Incline railway, also
 saw the prisoner in the vicinity of the
 incline railway on Thursday afternoon.
 When asked if he wanted to ask
 Miss Sims any questions—Ryan said:
 "You did not see me there, did
 you?"
 "Yes, I did," said Miss Sims.
 "Oh, were you the lady at the up-
 stair window?" asked Ryan. "I went
 to the house to ask the direction to
 the asylum, and when I could not
 make the people hear at the door,
 I thought I would go inside to make
 them hear. I came to this city from
 Port Hope for the purpose of joining
 the army, because I thought it would
 make a man of me. I went to the
 camp, I did intend going to Petawawa
 with the battery on June 3rd,
 but I see my chances are very slim
 now. I was born in Belfast, Ire-
 land, where I should have stayed,
 and I am a single man and a car-
 penter by trade."
 He was then charged with breaking
 into the residence of David J. Simons,
 43 East Strachan street, and stealing
 a number of copper which were part
 of a collection. He is supposed to
 have gained entrance to the house
 through a rear window.
 He also pleaded "not guilty" to
 breaking into the residence of John
 McCarthy, Strachan and Catharine
 streets, where, it is said, he stole a
 pearl ring. The ring was found later
 on in the pawnshop of Mrs. Levey,
 North James street. Mr. Levey iden-
 tified the prisoner, and said that
 when he pawned the ring, he said he
 wanted thirty cents to help him to
 Quebec.
 Ryan has been in jail on several
 other occasions and a list of offences
 which he had committed in Port Hope
 was read by Sergt. Campbell, who ar-
 rested the prisoner last Friday night.
 Ryan was found guilty and sentenced
 to three years in penitentiary. In
 giving sentence the magistrate said
 that Ryan was a man that needed
 someone to look after him, judging
 from the foolish things he did.

Should Get This Picture.
 A citizen suggests that the board
 of health obtain a reel of moving pic-
 tures pertaining to boiling of water,
 such as was shown in the Orpheum
 theatre about a week ago, and show

 a drop of water. Those who saw this
 film will understand why it is neces-
 sary that water should be boiled,
 when mixed with sewage. The picture
 showed a drop of water magnified and
 the number of living germs in it. It

 water had been filtered, showing it
 perfectly pure.

ACID WAS TOO HOT.
 Young Woman Unable to Take
 Enough to Suffer.

Perth, May 19.—A young woman by
 the name of Annie Lark, has been a
 victim of hallucinations for a consid-
 erable time, and as the days went by
 her troubles became intensified, with
 the result that she made up her mind
 that life was no longer worth the
 struggle. On Monday she decided to
 end it all. She procured a quantity of
 carbolic acid, and pouring out a
 quantity of it, succeeded in taking
 about a teaspoonful.
 Medical aid was at once summoned
 when it was found that she had not
 taken enough of the deadly poison to
 cause death, but that the case was
 one for the authorities to deal with.
 The young woman was taken to the
 local magistrate, and evidence
 being sufficient she was lodged in the
 county jail to await the progress of
 the law to have her removed to the
 proper institution. When questioned
 why she took the poison Miss Lark
 said she wanted to burn out the pain
 inter which she imagined was inside
 her, but that as the carbolic was so
 hot she did not think she could take
 enough to accomplish her purpose.
 She further stated that she would
 not take any more of it.

AGREEMENT ON POTASH ISSUE.
 Germans and Americans in Confer-
 ence Settle Dispute.

Hamburg, May 19.—At the German
 American potash conference yesterday
 a full agreement was arrived at, re-
 garding the prices of potash and for
 an adjustment of the super tax. The
 text of the agreement is now being
 drafted and new contracts will be ar-
 ranged immediately.
 The conference was attended by
 Messrs. Peter B. Bradley, William
 Bradley, James L. Gifford and other
 representatives of the American potash
 interests and the representatives of the
 German potash syndicate.
 Preliminary German inspired state-
 ments regarding the details of the
 agreement intimate that some increase
 in American prices is involved. The
 most difficult problem in the potash
 negotiations was furnished by the
 existing contracts with German inde-
 pendent companies by which the Am-
 ericans are bound for a long time. The
 adjustment of these contracts is left
 to the Americans.
