FIGHT IMPERIALISTS

VIEW LE CANADA TAKES OF LAURIER'S MISSION

To the Imperial Conference in London—To Demand the Autonomy of the Dominion.

Montreal, May 19.—In a column long editorial, La Canada, repeats the assertion that the chief business of Premier Sir Wilfrid Laurier in London will be thwarting the plans of imperialists who would draw the mother country and the colonies closer together. The editorial concludes: "It will be seen from these extracts that the idea of imperial federation and the establishing of a common foreign policy for the empire, and a common military and naval policy, is in the air in London as it is in Canada amongst our imperialist friends. Thus Sir Wilfrid has an important mission to fulfil at the conference in opposing all projects of this kind."

"Sir Wilfrid has always been of the opinion that to engage in the foreign policy to Great Britain would be to risk grave obligations. He will have with him in seeking to maintain the autonomy of the dominions the support of General Botha and Hon. Mr. Fisher, as well as that of all loyal British citizens who stand above all for the autonomy of their respective colonies."

To Spare Life of an Italian Husband

Slayer.

The following letter from the Toronto Suffrage association has been sent to Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, minister of justice at Ottawa:

"Dear Sir,—The Toronto Suffrage association earnestly plead for a speedy commutation of the death sentence passed upon Angelina Napolitano, since every additional hour spent by her in the condition of terror anticipating her execution on August the 9th, cannot but react in a deleterious manner upon her unborn innocent child."

"They further hold that the woman's condition at the time at which she committed the crime aggravated the sense of provocation received, and they, therefore, earnestly hope that the sentence of death will be commuted to one of imprisonment and that this decision be communicated to her as soon as possible."

"The association sincerely hope that all societies and individuals throughout the country, who feel that this unfortunate foreign woman should not, owing to the circumstances surrounding her case, suffer the extreme penalty of the law, will in some way make their desire known to the minister of justice."

ATTRACTING INTEREST.

Physicians Seek Means to Cure Glanders Case.

Washing, May 19.—Contagious disease experts of the public health service and other Washington physicians are seeking means of curing E. M. C. Combs, a Virginia farmer, who was taken to the district quarantine station suffering with the supposedly fatal disease of glanders. The case is attracting great interest among the members of the medical profession here, few physicians having ever treated glanders in a human being. Although little hope is held for Combs' recovery, experiments will be conducted to effect a cure.

Mr. Combs' wife, a trained nurse, is still confined in the quarantine station with her husband, for whom she is caring. So far she has shown no signs of having contracted the disease.

Dr. Francis of the public health service, has received a tube of Mr. Combs' blood sent him by Dr. J. A. Flynn, who discovered the case. He is now experimenting in an effort to discover a cure for the disease.

In the case of horses the disease is treated with a serum, but this never has been used for human beings. Dr. Fowler is at present applying strong antiseptics to the ulcers.

In looking up the history of the disease, Dr. Flynn discovered that up to 1890, there had been only about 300 cases of glanders reported in the world. Of these cases, the majority of the persons affected died.

A SAD EVENT.

Falls to His Death; Sister Sees Tragedy.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 19.—A. V. Hartle, a young Ohioan, ambitious to become an aviator, fell to his death on Wednesday at the aviation grounds where Arch Hoxsey was killed on December 31st.

It was Hartle's second day's apprenticeship as a birdman. After several minutes in the air, traversing the course at an elevation of about 100 feet, he apparently lost control of his machine, and pitched from his seat, landing on his head and shoulders. He died in a few minutes. His sister witnessed her brother's death and was prostrated by the shock.

The official report of the accident says it was "caused by the breaking of one of the ailerons."

Hartle was twenty-six years old and is survived by one brother and four sisters.

Big Addition Planned.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., May 19.—Joseph H. Norman, proprietor of the Hotel Norman, has decided to make an extensive addition to the hotel. A two-story building, seventy by eighty feet will be erected on the Catherine street side. On the first floor there will be a sample room, a garage and an electric laundry, and on the second floor there will be twenty additional rooms. The work will be commenced within a few days and will be completed within two months.

Four Deaths From Heat.

Chicago, May 19.—Four deaths resulted here on Thursday from the excessive heat. The mercury touched ninety degrees this afternoon, a record which, until this week had not been reached so early for thirty-six years.

Ex-Premier Loses Wife.

Quebec, May 19.—The wife of Hon. E. J. Flynn, ex-premier minister of Quebec, died on Thursday. She was the daughter of the late Augustine Cote, proprietor of Le Journal de Quebec, one of the first newspapers published in Quebec.

Chicago, May 19.—Because the crying of the four-year-old son of Mrs. Selma Kenks annoyed him, George Kime stole the child, the police say. He is on trial and refuses to tell where the baby is.

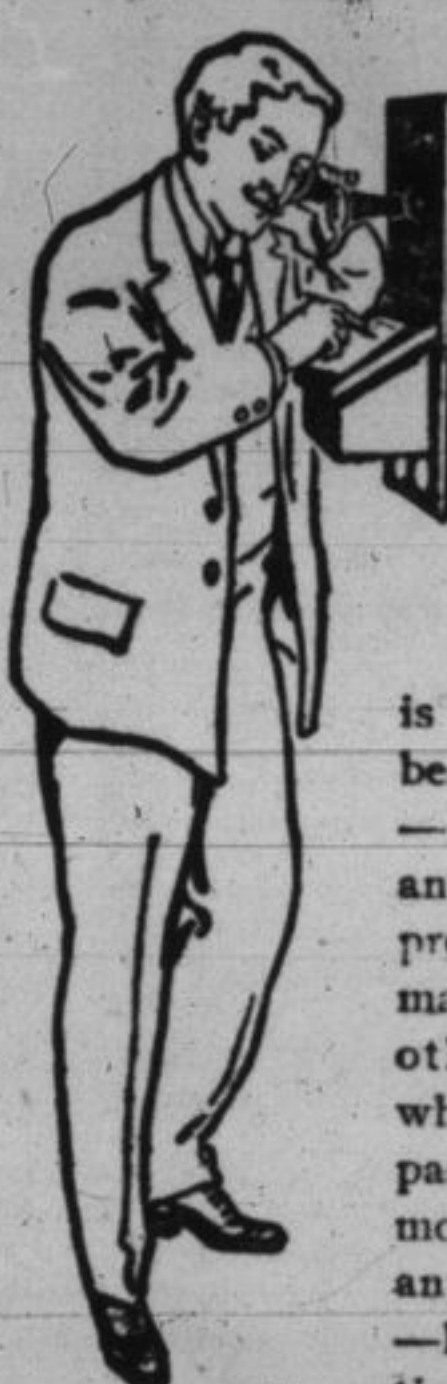
