## ASK FOR TENDERS

FOR REPAIRS TO OLD LADDER TRUCK.

Specifications Will be Prepared for the Necessary Work—Estimate Given That Work can be Done for About \$600—New Truck Would Cost \$1,375.

Tenders will be called for repairs to the old ladder truck of the fire department, about which there has been so much discussion. It was decided upon, at a meeting of the fire and light committee, held on Friday afternoon, on motion of Ald. Fair. The chairman and the chief were appointed to arrange the specifications, etc.

The cost of a new ladder truck will be \$1,375, while an estimate which was submitted at a recent meeting of the committee, stated that the repairs to the old truck, to put it in good shape, would amount to about \$600. This is just an estimate, the actual cost might be more.

The committee, at its last meeting, recommended to the council, that a new ladder truck be purchased, but this recommendation was sent back to the committee, for a further report, it being felt that the sum of \$1,375 was too much to expend on a new truck. ### TRENTON CARRIES BY-LAW

For Fixed Assessments and for Carnegie Library.

Trenton, May 20.—Three important by-laws were carried by large majorities, yesterday. The first by-law grants fixed assessment for ten years to the Canadian Iron Mines company, a newly formed company, with capital of \$1,500,000, which has taken over three iron mines in North Hastings. Sir Wilfrid declined to express any opinion on political topics.

## GOES TO PRISON

ACTRESS AIDS LOVER TO SWINDLE SWINDLER.

Impersonates Rich Woman and Forges Notes in His Favor for \$50,000. Then Skips with the Loot.

Berlin, May 20.—After a continuous session of seven hours, the Russian "money broker" Margolin and Frau Erna Froelich, once a popular opera singer, were found guilty of forgery and fraud and sentenced to forty-two months' hard labor and eighteen months' imprisonment respectively.

The closing scenes of the trial were highly dramatic. Just before the jury retired a few minutes before midnight, Margolin addressed the court in his own defense, asking no mercy for himself, but begging clemency for his sweetheart, Frau Froelich. "Don't add to the burden on my conscience by convicting her," he exclaimed. Then the actress, crying piteously, appealed to the jury to find mitigating circumstances in her case.

When the jury returned the court was still crowded with spectators, who had followed the proceedings since nine o'clock, the previous morning. Margolin received his sentence stolidly, but Frau Froelich turned deathly pale and stood as if suddenly turned to stone. The prisoners have appealed for a retrial.

Public interest centered less upon the accusation against the prisoners than in the persons directly implicated in it, namely, the so-called "Count" de la Rapée, who, representing himself as the heir of a French nobleman, married Beranin Alice Hecht, the daughter of one of Berlin's wealthiest merchant princes. The real name of the "count," who is a Hungarian, is Bela Kimm.

In Wiesbaden the "count" met Frau Hecht, who fell in love with him. The couple, eloped to London and were there married. The "count" was afterward arrested, but his wife's identity remained unknown. His ability to charm wealthy women and his shrewdness at cards brought him, it is alleged, much revenue. One Berlin nobleman is said to have pawned \$25,000 worth of jewels and turned the proceeds over to the captivating "count."

In his quest for fresh funds, De la Rapée made the acquaintance of Margolin and Fraulien Froelich. Margolin offered to secure \$75,000 immediately for the couple, but as he could not negotiate their notes without security, he and his sweetheart hit upon the plan of forging the indorsement of Frau Hecht, the "Countess" de la Rapée's wealthy mother. Fraulien Froelich, dressed in widow's weeds, impersonated Frau Hecht before a notary and signed her name to notes for sums aggregating \$50,000. These Margolin had little difficulty in negotiating as the name and wealth of Frau Hecht are well known in Berlin.

Instead of turning the money over to the "count" and his wife, however, Margolin is alleged to have appropriated it. He and his actress-wife subsequently disappeared from Berlin and lived in the best hotels of the Riviera, Switzerland and Austria, until they were finally arrested at St. Petersburg. After being brought to Germany, Margolin and his sweetheart made full confession of their guilt.

### FIND HOARD OF MISER.

Relatives Uncertain Valuables Amounting to \$60,000.

Springfield, Mo., May 20.—An inventory showing the estate of James T. Burge, of this place, to be \$60,680.46 was filed in the Greene county probate court. Most of the property is cash and notes, found secreted behind door jambs, inside desk top drawers and beneath false floor top. The gold, which he had hoarded for many years, filled a water bucket.

Before his death Burge left the house and lot where he had lived for thirty years to Orrie Northrip, a twelve-year-old son of a neighbor, who had nursed him during his last illness.
