All authorities on African native government have deplored the great harm that has been done, not purposely but unwit-tingly, by administrative officers possessing little or no knowledge of the language, habits and customs, institutions, and traditions of the people they are called upon to administer. Impatient for so-called progress, they have at times trampled under foot the very institutions which should have been preserved if they had had any regard for the essential advancement

the people

Great and enduring patience therefore expected from all adminis trative officers, for exasperating though it may seem to see things slowly, it is worse to upset ideals and customs so little understood. It is not from the present generation that we may look for much - the succeeding generation are in the hands of administrative officers, and it is for them to sould the people as best they can with the educative means at their disposal. It must certainly be their endeavor to lift the natives to a higher plane of civilization, but this can only be achieved by gradual methods and by observing existing conditions. Every improvement must le by a nat ural process of evolution which will cause no extreme dislocation of pres ent circumstances. We should support the authority of the chiefs, coun cils of elders, and headmen in native reserves, and the prestige and inflyence of the chiefs can be best upheld allowing the peasantry to see that Government itself treats them as an integral part of the machinery of the administration. Native tribes vary greatly, and whilst some have a nat ural genius for self-government, oth ers are more primitively constituted.

Many of the tribes in East Africa have no chiefs of recognized authority but where this is the case tribal o family authority is vested in a chosen council of elders. By upholding the authority of the chiefs and elders it is not intended to imply that officers should sit down and enforce blindly all orders issued by these men who, efter all, are in a sense savages. The main object of administering the people through their chiefs is to prevent disintegration amongst the tribe; but active interest, supervision, and guidance on the part of the officers of the administration are all necessary for
