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Quaint Ritual of Coronation

Entire Ceremony of Crowning of King and Queen Is Symbolic of a Wedding to the British Nation. Some of the Emblems Are Old and Have Strange Legends Associated With Them.

On June 22nd King George V. will be crowned in Westminster Abbey with all the quaint rites and elaborate ceremonial which, with the exception of certain minor alterations, have been religiously observed at the coronation of every sovereign in England since the time of William the Conqueror.

Land met an aged man who gave them the very ring, and asked them to return it to the King and tell him that the supposed beggar was none other than St. John the Evangelist. Another quaint medieval story recounts how the anointing oil was miraculously delivered to Thomas Becket by the Virgin Mary.

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The existing emblems were made on the old model for the coronation of Charles II. The scepters, or sword of Mercy, is the principal one in dignity of the three which are carried unheathed before the King.



THE QUEEN'S CROWN. of gold studded with precious stones. The right of holding the orb is the sole prerogative of reigning kings and queens, a custom adopted by the early Saxon sovereigns from the Roman emperors.

Legend and mysticism surround the orb, the orb associated with the ancient ceremonial. The coronation ring, according to the "Golden Legend," was given by Edward the Confessor to a beggar who asked alms of him. Not long afterwards, two English pilgrims in the Holy

SALUTE ROUND THE WORLD. FROZEN REGIONS.

Crash of Artillery Will Announce the Placing of the Crown. Not only in Canada, but in every part of the Empire, guns will boom forth simultaneously at the exact moment when the crown is placed upon the head of the King in Westminster Abbey on Thursday, June 22.

Although no definite arrangements have yet been made, it can be anticipated that royal salutes will be fired in the usual places at all regimental headquarters in Canada boasting artillery corps or cannon.

The Colonial Office has made a request to the Earl Marshal to be informed of the exact minute the crown will be placed upon the King's head, and the information—it is expected that the time will be within a few minutes of two o'clock—will be communicated by the Colonial Office to every part of the Empire, so that arrangements for saluting the King can be made well in advance.

Threatened men live long. In his early days, when he announced his intention of becoming a minister of the Gospel, that wonderful old man, General Booth, who, at the age of eighty, is still in harness, forming schemes for the reformation of the world's outcasts, was told by the doctor that "it would be sheer suicide. You would be dead in a year," said the physician. But young Booth would not be deterred. He went ahead with his ideas, and, although he was the sole support of his mother, found time to conduct evangelistic meetings in the slum districts after business hours.

Friends were found who sympathized, and one invested a small capital—about \$25,000—in William Booth's interest. It is from the income this sum brings in that the general has brought up his family, and at present his only personal moneys are derived from the same source. He does not draw a single penny from the funds of the army, merely receiving his traveling expenses from that source.

Racing to the South Pole. Captain Scott has a rival in his dash to the South Pole in the person of Captain Amundsen, the famous Norwegian explorer, the first man to accomplish the navigation of the Northwest Passage. It is in connection with the latter expedition that the captain tells an amusing Eskimo story. Having lost several dogs, Captain Amundsen, in his best Eskimo, intimated his desire to purchase one from a certain tribe. To his surprise, however, the request was promptly refused. An explanation was demanded, and the man applied to returned next day with a chubby, laughing boy on his back. "Such we do not sell," said the native. The explorer was astonished, something was wrong. "You wished to purchase one," said the man, seeing Captain Amundsen perplexed. Finally, it was discovered that the Greenlandic term for "dog" was equivalent to "child" in the Netchille language.

Electrical Tree. There is a peculiar tree in the forests of Central India which has most curious characteristics. The leaves of the tree are of a highly sensitive nature and so full of electricity that whoever touches one of them receives an electric shock. It has a very singular effect upon a magnetic needle and will influence it at a distance of even 70 feet. The electrical strength of the trees varies according to the time of day, being at its height at midday and weakest at midnight. In wet weather its power disappears altogether. Birds never approach the tree, nor have insects ever been seen upon it.

"Nurse Grimston." Aristocratic nurses in hospitals are no novelty, but few ladies have adopted the nursing profession more wholeheartedly than Lady Sybil Grimston, fifth daughter of the Earl and Countess of Verulam, who is known at the London Hospital Nurses' Training Home at Bow as "Nurse Grimston." Upon the dormitory list appears the simple notification, "H. Grimston, Sybil." By the way, Lady Sybil's father in appearance closely resembles the late King Edward, and was frequently mistaken for him in the streets of London when his majesty was alive.

England's Oldest Bachelor. This distinction belongs to Mr. Holt, Crichton, of Catterham, England, who has just entered his 100th year, and is descended from the Crichtons of Cluny, the same branch as the "Admirable Crichton." Born in Perthshire in 1812, Mr. Crichton has lived in six reigns. He first tried the law, and then went to Australia, where he was one of the first settlers. He is a splendid shot and a keen billiard-player.
