Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 15 years old may homestead a quarter section of land. Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, etc. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by a son, daughter, wife, or conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties. Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may be required to pay a fee of \$100 for a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. A homesteader may also be required to have good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$12 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or improvements in months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required for the issuance of homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a second homestead may be required to purchase a homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

THE AGE OF NINETY.

Gananoque, May 29.—George Bruton, an aged resident of the Front of Leeds township, died on Friday evening, in the ninetieth year of his age. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon from the home of his son-in-law, Robert Elliott, to Hailestad cemetery, and was largely attended.
