SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male or female person, may homestead a quarter section of land in the Dominion of Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Land Office, Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district in which a patent may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteaders.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead for a term of at least 60 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother or daughter.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land in his homestead. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Deposit must be paid on the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of application, failing which the right to apply for a homestead is lost.
