THE QUARTERLY RALLY OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES OF THE CITY.

Held in the First Congregational Church—First Baptist Church Won the Banner—More Personal Work Urged.

The quarterly rally of the young people's societies of Kingston, was held in the First Congregational church, Monday evening. It was the first rally to be held during the warm weather, and President Robert Treener explained that the reason the rally was held at this date was not to leave so long a lapse between this meeting and the one which is to be held in September. There was not so large an attendance as has been at other meetings, but, considering the warm weather, the societies were well represented.

The awarding of the banner this time was somewhat of a somewhat different basis. Other times the banner had been awarded to the society having the largest percentage of members present. This time the societies were required to give the attendance at the April and May consecration meetings as well as the attendance at the quarterly rally. First Baptist society succeeded in capturing the banner, its average attendance at the meetings mentioned being seventy-five and one-quarter per cent., the nearest competitor, St. John's, having seventy per cent. The gathering on account of the one in charge forgetting to bring it.

The greater part of the evening was taken up by the two speakers, Mr. Jones of Union Street Baptist church, and Rev. A. J. Mackinnon of the First Congregational church. The former's subject was "Individual Work For Individuals" and his talk was illustrated by many pointed remarks and happenings from real life. He said he had found from personal experience that sometimes, some one whom perhaps you would suspect of having an interest in religious things, longed for some one to speak to him about his soul. He urged the young people connected with the different societies to do their share in this personal work for the banner.

Rev. Mr. Mackinnon spoke along much the same line. He said the young people of a church were its greatest salvation. The young people were in the best time of life to have great influence for good and to have marvelous working capacity. He said they could do more for their church than any other society in the church. He told of many incidents which had come under his observation of where a little bit of personal work had changed the career of more than one person. President Treener spoke of a suggestion which had been made at the executive meeting of having a special "adventure week" in the fall, wherein each member should get out and do personal work for Christ. A standing vote was taken of those who would pledge themselves to devote a week to this kind of work, and quite a large number responded.

The president mentioned the fact that the Congregational union of Canada was having a meeting in the city from June 6th to 12th and that the evening of the 12th had been given over to young people societies. Invitations had been extended to all societies in the city, and he hoped, as many as possible would avail themselves of the opportunity to attend this meeting.

CORONATION PREPARATIONS.

Elaborate Improvements Are Being Rushed in London. London, May 30.—Every day, as the coronation grows nearer, and the preparations for the event advance, London begins to resemble more and more a colossal boarding. Presently, the vast stands which are being erected everywhere, will be covered with colored cloths and decorated with flags, but for weeks past, and for some weeks to come, half the familiar objects of the city have been disappearing in an incoming sea of poles, barricades and tiers of seats. Behind these, and inside these, buildings, statues and grass plots are fast being lost.

Westminster Abbey is becoming little more than a roof behind which looks like an enormous scaffolding for a new transept and aisle. In front of it, where the grass plots and the flower beds, surrounded by the statues of great statesmen stand a week or so ago, there is an erection of poles, more like the slaps for building iron-roads than anything else. The side of Westminster Hall, a little to the right, is beginning to be lost to view, and the statue of Cromwell has already been blotted out, in a way which must be quite cheering to the Irish members, who made an unsuccessful attempt to have it removed when it was first put up. A little further off, in Whitehall, the entire garden close to the old palace of Whitehall, has been converted into one enormous stand, and so it is in every direction, along which the processions will pass.

Down in the Strand, the Church of St. Clement Danes, facing on to the open space at the boundaries of the city, is covered by great erections of wood, with the effect that the bronze effigy of Dr. Johnson, which stands with its eye perpetually fixed on the unfamiliar griffin which has taken the place of the Temple Bar he loved so well, has, for the time being, been saved any painful recollections of the days when, accompanied by Boswell or by Beattie, he was in the habit of taking his walk down Fleet street.

She made her debut in a frivolous, festive mood at the fancy dress ball of the Royal Institution, where she waited with boundless youths, many of whom were journalists, a profession which she abhors. Women writers and artists who were present were distinctly annoyed at hearing her announce that she did not care to meet women and only wanted to see men.

THE NE TEMERÉ DÉCRET

Subject of a Sermon by Archbishop Fortin. Winnipeg, May 29.—Archbishop Fortin, at Holy Trinity (Anglican) church on Sunday, preached a strong sermon in support of the encyclical of the English church bishops, read last Sunday, with special reference to the Ne Temere decree. He calls the stand of Catholic judges in Quebec one against which the English church must take a stand with others not of the Catholic church. "This is a Protestant country," he says. "We refuse to be oppressed in any way by a foreign Italian bishop."

Winston Churchill, the home secretary, was, on Sunday, presented with a son and heir. Mother and child are doing nicely. President Fallières, of France, has signed the nomination of General Guoian as minister of war in place of the late M. Bertaux.

WILD WEATHER IN MONTH OF JUNE

Prof. Hicks Foresees All Sorts of Things for the Coming Month; Rain, Followed by Drouth.

Rev. H. Hicks' predictions for the month of June are as follows: A regular rainy period covers the first six days of June. The Mercury and Venus periods also bear upon and intensify disturbances at this period. The crisis of these storms will fall on and touching the 11th and 12th. A low barometer, high temperature and humidity may be put down as forecasting severe storms at this time. Rising barometer and change to fair and much cooler weather will pass eastwardly over the country from the 6th to 9th.

A reactionary storm period will bring decided storm conditions on 12th, touching the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th. At this period we enter into the June solstice disturbances. The solstice period extends from the 10th to the end of June. The full moon on the 11th falls at the central day of the annual mercurial and electric crisis. Within three days of sunset on the 11th, a maximum of magnetic and electric storms will visit many wide extremes of the earth, attended by phenomenal "earth currents" much volcanic unrest and violent seismic shakes.

A regular storm period extends from the 13th to the 17th, being at the crisis of the Mercury period and under full strain of the solstice and the Venus periods. Daily thunder storms, with an excess of electricity, wind, rain and hail may be expected. Change to very much cooler will follow about the 16th to 19th.

A reactionary storm period will make itself severely felt on 20th and 21st and 22nd. This period is at the exact centre of the summer solstice and great electrical manifestations will mark this period. In all this part of the month we may look for an excess of lightning all round the heavens, in early evenings and through the nights.

A regular storm period is central on the 23rd, the new moon falling on the same day, moon being in perigee and at greatest north declination. In every probability this will prove one of the most decisive periods of disturbance during the month. The barometer should be consulted with care as we enter the period, and if it falls to very low reading—a result to be expected—storms of violent character should be apprehended. All storms during the last half of June will be erratic in character—will move in directions out of the ordinary, often doubling back over their tracks after they have supposedly passed off to the east. We believe there will be too much rain in June, for best agricultural interests, except in New England states, and the extreme southern and south-western sections. A marked seismic period is central on the 26th, covering the 23rd to the 29th.

As we pass out of June we believe that drouth and drouth will pinch most parts of the country through the remaining part of the summer, into the late autumn.

A RIOT IN SIGHT.

Flag of Peru Burned by Mob in Chile. Iquique, Chile, May 29.—A mob, on Sunday, attacked the Peruvian Club and burned the flag of Peru. Troops were summoned to quell the rioting and several persons were wounded. The Peruvian consul has resigned and has asked the American consul to protect Peruvian interests at this place.

The organization of the mob and the rioting that followed were the outcome of publication in the newspapers that the Chilean consulate at Callao, Peru, had been attacked and the consul wounded. Diplomatic relations between Peru and Chile were severed more than a year ago. The Chilean government withdrew its legation at Lima, and Peruvian government withdrew its legation at Santiago. This action was brought about by the expulsion of Peruvian priests from the provinces of Tacna and Arica.

DAIRY PRODUCE.

The Cheese Market is Very Easy in Tone. Montreal, May 29.—Receipts of cheese Saturday were 10,143 boxes, making total receipts for the week, 45,536 boxes, as against 45,679 boxes for the corresponding week of last year. The local market is easy in tone with finest quoted at 10c, to 10 1/2c. Receipts of butter, to-day, were 3,075 packages, making total receipts for the week, 16,887 packages, as against 14,652 packages for the corresponding date of last year.

CALL TO VANCOUVER CHURCH.

Presbyterian Pastor Likely to Accept Invitation. St. Thomas, Ont., May 29.—Rev. E. Lettie Pigeon, pastor of Knox Presbyterian church, St. Thomas, received a telegram from the congregation of St. John's church, Vancouver, B.C., extending to him an invitation to become pastor of the church at a salary of \$3,500, with an advance of \$4,000 within two years. He will probably accept.

Trapped by Flames.

Kittanning, Pa., May 29.—Three boys were burned to death in the fiery stable of Vance Jewart, of Sagamore, near here. The dead are: Earl Jewart, aged twelve; Jesse Jewart, aged ten; Hugh Flannigan, aged fourteen, a companion of the Jewart boys. The lads spent Saturday night in Pittsburg. Returning home late they went to sleep in the stable. Fire was discovered early in the morning and they were cremated before it was known they were in the stable. Twelve horses also were burned.
