

GEORGE BERNARD SHAW,
Makes Extraordinary and Blasphemous Statements.

London, May 30.—In addressing a gathering of undergraduates at Cambridge, to-day, George Bernard Shaw said: "The man who says that Christ was the highest possible being is not worth working with. Christ was a failure."

Mr. Shaw's subject was "The Future of Religion." Among other things he said in the matter besides that already quoted was: "The mention of God has gone out of fashion. You never hear about God now in parliament, and only occasionally in the law courts. The people are governed by a system of idolatry. The clergymen, the judges and the kings are idols, who generally have to be given enough money to dress better than other people. The king cannot impose upon me. I know that the king is merely a man, but scarcely anyone else in England seems to know it." When Darwin came along with the theory of natural selection people jumped at it and kicked God out of the window."

FAMINE IS FEARED.

Parral, Mex., May 30.—Word has reached here that scores of people have been killed and stores looted by Indians and insurgents who heard nothing of the peace agreement. A famine threatens the interior, as all railway communication is cut off. The entire state of Durango, with its capital, is at the mercy of roving bands.

TO STOP NEGRO IMMIGRATION.

Conditions in Oklahoma, Their Home, Have Been Changed.

Winnipeg, May 30.—W. J. White, who has charge of the immigration offices as representative of the Canadian government in the United States, said in an interview here that the influx of negroes from Oklahoma was likely to terminate soon. Discrimination against colored men in that state has been partially removed by decision of the supreme court at Washington on questions relating to franchise. Churches are opposed to the movement, and the dominion government similarly regards it. It is recognized that the climate of western Canada is unsuitable for negroes, and every effort will be made by organizations interested in keeping them in the south to show the merit of their attempting to make a livelihood in this country.

WILL PLEAD INSANITY.

The Mother of Toronto Murderer Was Insane.

Toronto, May 30.—Jessiman, who shot Loughheed, yesterday, did not appear in court this morning. The inquiry on Longhead's death takes place this afternoon and will probably be short and formal. Jessiman's defense will no doubt be insanity. The report that his father died insane is denied. His mother was insane.

KILLED IN AUTO RACE.

Indianapolis, May 30.—In a big auto race here today a tire on the car driven by Arthur Greiner, Chicago, blew out. The car left the track. S. B. Dickson was killed, and Greiner was seriously injured.

WAS TOO ROUGH.

Magistrate Decides That Violent Ejaculation is Unlawful.

Chatham, May 30.—A man may not throw his mother-in-law from his premises in a rough manner that is calculated to do her bodily harm. This was the decision reached by Magistrate Houston when he fined Bertie Avery \$1 and costs for ejecting his mother-in-law, Mrs. Lydia Turner, from his house, doing actually bodily harm.

The physician called gave evidence as to the injuries which the woman sustained. There were bruises on her arms, which seemed to indicate that she had been used rather roughly.

The magistrate held that while Avery had no right to order her off the premises and use reasonable force to put her off he was bound by law not to do her bodily harm in removing her. He, therefore, imposed a fine of \$1 and costs.

King Pays Tribute to Labor.

London, May 30.—The king has paid an unprecedented honor to the labor movement by a "command" invitation to two representatives of the trades union to attend the coronation ceremony.

After the concert on Monday night the king and queen and the royal party attended Lady Farquharson's ball, which was given in honor of the Duke of York's daughters, the Princesses Alexandra and Mary.

The king and some of the royal princes will attend the Epsom race meeting daily until Friday.

A 10,000 Mile Bicycle Trip.

Toronto, May 30.—The railway commission orders that sour cream for butter-making may be carried at express instead baggage rates. Railways have offered to file a uniform tariff for all cream. The views of the milk company will be heard before the order is made.

Captured Nolan.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., May 30.—After an exciting chase, Provincial Constable Connor, succeeded in catching William Nolan, who escaped from arrest at the Michigan Soo four days ago.

Has Been Sworn In.

Toronto, May 30.—Hon. Charles Moss was sworn in, to-day, as administrator of the province during the absence, in England, of Hon. J. M. Gibson, Lieutenant-governor.

The marriage of Miss Elma Kennedy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Kennedy, Westport, and J. K. Kerr Brown, Phm. B., of Winnipeg, was quietly celebrated, Thursday, at the home of the bride's brother, W. Walker Kennedy, Winnipeg.

RETURNED TO WORK

STONEMASONS ARE AGAIN ON
THE JOB.

They Were Ordered Back to Their Work by Thomas Izard on Tuesday Morning—Laborers Still Holding Out For an Increase.

The strike in Kingston, so far as the stone cutters and the masons are concerned, is off.

Thomas Izard, the officer from international headquarters, who has been in the city a couple of weeks, is endeavoring to bring about a settlement, ordered the stonemasons back to work, and they all returned to work on Tuesday morning. They are all on their regular work, with the exception of those who had been employed on the new building at Queen's university, and they have secured other work. The stonemasons are all back at work, too.

The laborers, however, are still on strike, and according to what the Whig could learn to-day, they intend to stay out until they get an increase from \$2 to \$2.25 per day. On the other hand, the contractors declare they will not give the increase, and the matter is at a deadlock.

It is believed by some, however, that the laborers will return to work in the course of a few days.

Asked by the Whig, how matters stood, Mr. Izard stated that the stonemasons had been holding off, in sympathy with the laborers. He had sized up the situation, found that no settlement could be reached, and he therefore came to the conclusion that the best thing to be done, was to order the stonemasons back to work again. He had been given to understand, however, that the laborers would not return unless the increase they asked for was forthcoming.

The general opinion appears to be that Mr. Izard acted wisely in taking the step he did, in ordering the stonemasons back to work.

The contractors will likely be able to get all the laboring men they require to do the work, and it is not likely that there will be any further delayback in the work. Work has been delayed for nearly a month now, and the contractors are very anxious to push things along.
